JERSEY CATTLE CLUB MEMBERS VISIT HERE

Stockmen On Jubilee Tour Guests At Banquet in Salem Last Night.

On their jubilee tour of the Willamette valley, members of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club reached Salem last evening in time for dinner at the Marion hotel. After the dinner, the champion Jersey men were given rides about the city and were later entertained at the Commercial club.

This morning the club left early for Monmouth to visit the stock farms of J. B. Stump & Son and Longhary & Howitt. Later in the day they visited the Oregon Agricultural college herd and then drove to the home of R. L. Burkhardt near Albany. After the luncheon today noon, near Albany, the stock farm of Henry Stewart was visited and then the party drove to visit the stock farms of J. M. Dickson & Son near Sheldahl and then to Pickard Bros. near Marion to see "Vive La France" and "Old Man's Darling II," two Jersey cows holding world records for the production of butterfat.

Tour Is Innivision.
For the first time in the history of any livestock association on the coast, practically all stock growers interested in the advancement of the Jersey interests of the county, have visited the homes of the most successful breeders and have met from day to day to discuss ways and means by which Oregon may soon become the center of the Jersey interests of the United States.

The Jersey men began their jubilee Tuesday in Portland with a trip along the Columbia highway. Wednesday morning they visited the "Iron Mine" farm at Oswego, arriving at noon at the home of Ed Cary at Carlton. Luncheon was served in the second story of the Cary barn.

Bankers in Party.
The party traveling in 30 automobiles next stopped at the farm of Frank Lynn at Perrydale where his fine herd of heifers, as well as his large barn came in for special attention. The McArthur & Stauff stock farm at Bicknell and the W. O. Morrow farm at Independence were the next stopping places for inspection.

Among the prominent men who were entertained at the Commercial club last evening with the Jersey stock growers were W. M. Ladd of the Ladd & Tilton bank, J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, and E. H. Barton of Chilwick, B. C., representing the Canadian Jersey cattle association.

Owners Of Mutual Phone Line Air Fight In Court

When the stockholders of a mutual telephone line cannot agree, there is recourse to the courts to settle all difficulties. This was done in the mix-up among the stockholders of the telephone line running from the donation inn claim of J. O. Putnam, thence up Abiqua creek to the land formerly owned by Laban Maudling and thence to Silverton.

On March 7 a majority of the stockholders met and decided to cut out about a mile of the line and connect with the Mutual Telephone company of Marquam, and with the Interurban Telephone company of Silverton. This was done at an expense of \$40.70, leaving no money in the treasury, but a common property of the one mile of wire taken down. Suit was brought before Judge George G. Bingham by the stockholders opposed to taking down the line.

Yesterday a decree was entered that the men opposed to taking down the line had been damaged in material to the extent of \$10 each. It was decreed that the property should be sold with Sheriff W. I. Needham as referee, and that the proceeds be divided among the stockholders according to their interests. The defendants in the suit who will receive the \$10 each besides their share of the proceeds of the sale are J. N. Van Arman, B. S. Dunnagan, Percy Lane, Wm. McKillip, W. W. Miller, Ernest Stewart and George Coleman.

POLK COUNTY PIONEER DIES AT HOME IN DALLAS SUNDAY

Dallas, May 22.—Henry D. Staats, one of Polk county's prominent farmers until a few years ago, passed away at his home on Levens street in this city Sunday afternoon following a few days illness with osteoplasia. Mr. Staats was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Staats who came to this county in 1845. The deceased was born on the old donation land claim near the present town of Airie, January 18, 1850, where he grew to young manhood.

Mr. Staats was united in marriage on February 20, 1873, to Mary E. Zumwalt who also was of a pioneer family and to this union two children were born. Mrs. Staats passed away in the early part of the ninety's and Mr. Staats was again united in marriage, this time to Miss Nora Church, who survives him, together with his two sons, Tracy Staats of this city and Emmett Staats of Monmouth.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Montgomery cemetery near Lewisville, the old burying ground of the early pioneers, Rev. D. V. Poling of Corvallis, an old friend of the family, officiating.

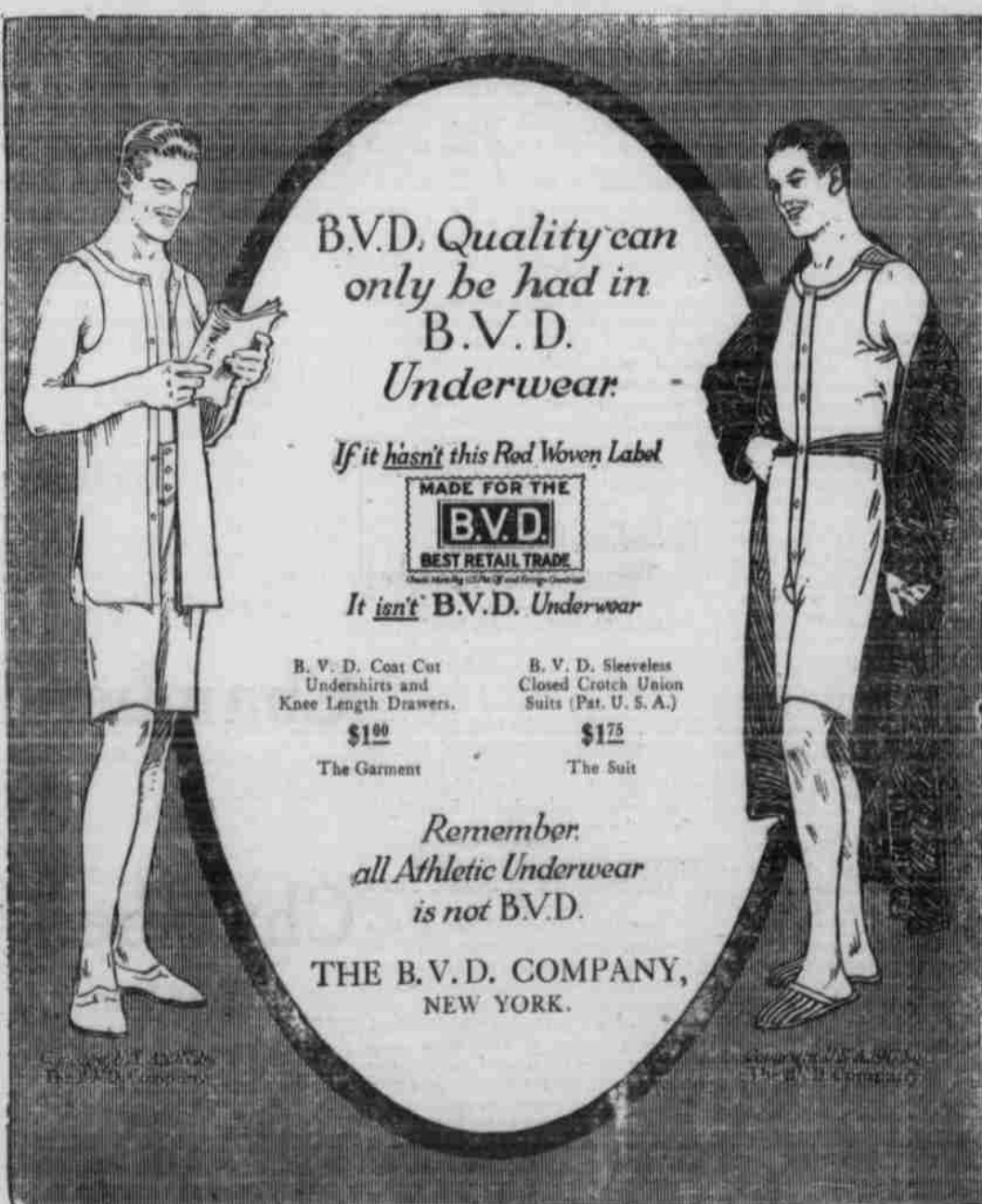
