STATE HOUSE NEWS

State Engineer Capper, has just outlined the more important changes made in the water, irrigation and drainage laws by the last legislature; made with a view to facilitating adjudication of right and the formation of irrigation districts.

Among other beneficial changes the new law provides that a landowner may turn over a portion of his land to an irrigation district as an offset against the irrigation charge against the balance of his property. Provision has also been made for the inclusion of land in an irrigation district by units, thus enabling a district to segregate those portions that entail a high cost of reclamation and assess them according to the cost of reclamation. Formerly it was customary to include all tracts of land in the district at a uniform cost

thus tending to exclude from districts those portions that would create a heavy cost.

An amendment passed now provides that irrigable and tillable lands lying within the confines of a municipality may be included in the irrigation district, thus making available a considerable area heretofore shut out. Another statute provides for the certification of drainage district bonds in the same manner as irrigation bonds. The entire work or revision of the laws has been favorable toward irrigation and reclamation interests.

State Forester Elliott, commenting upon the proposition of the Portland Aero club to secure federal co-operation with the state in forest fire prevention by airplane patrol, expresses the opinion that nothing in this line will be accomplished this season, though Senator McNary has brought the matter before the department at Washington. The assumption was that as the government has an immense amount of air material on hand and no particular use for it, a

part of the equipment might be apportioned to Oregon where it would be utilized in the protection of both private and government timber. Some-thing of this kind will be done in California this year because of the fact that California has the equipment already on the ground, along with amply flying grounds. Oregon must resort to heavy expense in this line before airplane service could be made available. However, Mr. Elliott points to the vast service the air patrols could render in Oregon and expresses the opinion that another year will find the airplanes on the job.
