### Oregon Pioneers To Hold Reunion In Portland Soon

The 47th reunion of the Oregon Pioneer association will be held in Portland Thursday, June 19. All persons coming to, or born in the original territory of Oregon up to 1859, without regard to their present residence are eligible for membership. All who came to any part of the Pacific coast up to 1859 and are now living in Oregon are also eligible as members of the Oregon Pioneer association. Pioneer headquarters will be in room C of the auditorium in Portland. The program for the afternoon of the reunion will include patriotic music on the great municipal organ and an address of welcome from Mayor Baker. The annual address will be given by Judge George W. Biddle, pioneer of 1852. There will be a special service of greeting to Mrs. Rebecca J. Barger, pioneer of 1847, now 94 years of age. The "Klose Muck-a-Muck" will be held in the auditorium in the afternoon of the reunion. This will be in charge of the organized woman's auxiliary of the Oregon Pioneer association. The social hour, "hi-yu wa-wa, hi-yu he-he" will follow the Klose muck-a-muck. The annual camp fire will begin at 8 o'clock in the evening.
