Tour Of Oregon Jersey Cattle Breeders Ended

The jubilee of the Oregon Jersey cattle breeders came to a close yesterday when the celebration reached the farm of Pickard Bros. at Marion. As a fitting climax to the tour of the valley beginning Tuesday, the owners of pure bred Jersey stock met at the Pickard farm to visit the most famous cow in the world, 'Viva la France,' with a record of 1031.64 pounds of butter in one year.

And along with the breeders of pure Jersey cattle there met about 500 people from all parts of the valley to honor the men who did so much in making the valley the center of the Jersey cattle interests of the county.

W. M. Ladd of Portland, who accompanied the club in its tour of the valley, presented Pickard Bros. with a magnificent silver cup given by the Oregon Jersey cattle club.

A special tribute was paid to Earl and Elza Pickard. Even without a silo and other advantages for producing the best results, they had presented to the world a champion butter producer. Mr. Pickard said that with better facilities he thought the cow could produce 1500 pounds of butter fat a year.
