### COURT HOUSE.

The suit of Mary A. Stiffler against Roy Stiffler and Oka Larson, has been decided in the circuit court as follows. The plaintiff is to recover \$64.55 from Albert C. Stiffler. Aaratus Stiffler, L. C. Stiffler and Oka Larson are barred from claiming or demanding from Albert C. Stiffler, any part of the \$300 received by Albert C. Stiffler from the city of Salem of demanding an accounting from him.

A decree has been handed down in the suit of Joseph Schmid against Henry and Sophia Krebs. The plaintiff is to recover \$114.75, with \$25 attorney's fees and costs of \$30.25 and the property involved in the case is to be foreclosed.

In the case of C. M. LaFollette against S. W. Jones, tried at the last term of court, the plaintiff has filed notice that he will appeal to the supreme court.

George May has brought suit against Math Berseheid and wife. He alleges that by false representations he was induced to part with 22 lots in Mt. Angel for a \$6000 mortgage on an elevator and land in Humbolt, Saskatchewan, which were represented to him to be worth from \$500 to \$6000. He alleges that after the deal had been made, he found out that the elevator was nothing but an old barn or shack and that instead of being a going concern, the parties owning the building were broke. He asks the court to determine his rights, and that the deed he gave for the lots in Mt. Angel be declared invalid.

The final account of the administratrix of the estate of Gottlieb Hirsch has been approved. The heirs are two young boys living at Marion.

An undivided one half interest in 55 feet off of a lot at Capital and Center streets has been appraised at \$1200.00. This appraisement was made in the matter of the guardianship of John Dayton Robertson.

The executors of the estate of Samuel White report \$90.25 on hand after paying all indebtedness.

The estate of Fritz Weber has been appraised at \$900.00 by John Ebner, Fred Schwab and Mat Beyer. The only heir is Benedict Weber, a brother living at Gens, in the Canton of Berne, Switzerland.
