Second Cousin Of Former Kaiser Dies In Seattle

Seattle, Wash., May 26.—Miss Elm Von Kalow, second cousin to William Hohenzollern, former emperor of Germany, and grand daughter of Prince Albert of Prussia, died Sunday afternoon at the home of her sister, Mrs. John Mountain, following an illness of two years.

Countess Anna Pauline Frederico Von Gortz, daughter of Prince Albert of Prussia, who became famous in Europe and America as a singer under the name of Madame Varina, and who died in Seattle on January 1, 1918, was the mother of Miss Von Kalow.

Miss Von Kalow was 37 years old, Her mother and father, Dr. Von Kalow, were both naturalized citizens and she had been a staunch American citizen all her life, notwithstanding her blood relationship to the ex-kaiser.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon.

Local Soldiers From Every Branch Of Service Returning Home.

The boys are gradually coming home. John W. Helman of 344 Front street arrived last evening from Camp Holabird, Maryland, where he had been stationed for 18 months. His work was mostly in handling freight, following the same line of work he did while in the Southern Pacific freight office before going into the service.

Alva Burless, former member of Company M, 162nd infantry, is home. He saw his share of real fighting. Shortly before the armistice was signed he was transferred from the front to the central postoffice at Tours, France, where he was assigned to special duty.

Breyman Boise will reach New York City Thursday of this week, according to word received yesterday by his father, R. P. Boise. He sailed from Bordeaux May 18 after having seen active service for 18 months in France. Just before returning, he was with the army of occupation in Germany. At one time much fear was felt regarding his safety as no word had been received from him for several months.

William Bone is home, having served in France with the 20th Engineers. Before enlisting, he was mailing clerk in the state printing office. He has a family of 2 wife and two children. Their home is on South 19th street.

Otto Kubin, another state employe returned to Salem yesterday. He arrived in France in August of 1917 and was in the air service serving at the front.

Glen Day, direct from the famous German city of Coblenz, is home again. He was with the medical corps. Mrs. Day, during his absence has been employed in the city recorder's office. She left a few days ago to meet her husband in Portland.

Allan Kafoury, former high school student is home. He was with the motor transport service in France and was in on the big stuff in the Argonne forests and at Chateau Thierry. He is a nephew of the Kafoury brothers dry-goods merchants of this city.

Rodney Alden, son of Dean and Mrs. George H. Alden is home. He was a member of Company M and left with the company in the spring of 1917. After his arrival in France he was transferred to the 35th infantry and was in the Argonne Forest drive. He received his discharge at Camp Lewis.

Survey Of Highway South Of Monmouth Is Under Way

(Capital Journal Special Service.) Monmouth, Or., May 28.—Engineer Fletcher and his crew of surveyors have been busy the past week making a preliminary survey of the main line of the West Side highway south of town.

As laid out by them the highway cuts Monmouth avenue at its north terminus, running straight south through town, then turns east, or southeast, over private land and crosses the Little railroad straight south. Three lines have been run over the cemetery hill in an attempt to strike the best grade, one going directly over and one skirting the hill on each side. As the hill is not a bad one, Mr. Fletcher thinks it quite likely that the commission will decide to go over it along the straight line of the main county road.
