ed at BonVillers and other villages in Picardy where the Centigny fighters made their supreme sacrifice. Numerous American and French pilgrims will walk from Chateau-Thierry to cemeteries in the Marne region.

Little plots of graves are on the very edge of Belleau Wood, whose jagged rocks and bare trees mutely tell the story of what happened there. Far up in Lorraine, beyond Toul, beyond Lunville, about Meul, Litmont and Beaumont rest the men, among the first to fall when our troops first entered the line.

On both sides of Soissons, where heavy stillness reigns now, graves mark the place where the First and Thirty-second divisions threw back the Germans, and all will be remembered.

Wilson Sends Message

Washington, May 29.—(United Press)—President Wilson in a Memorial day message to the American people today declared that the "impressive lesson and the inspiring mandate of the day" is to fulfill the hopes and purposes to the utmost of the men who sacrificed their lives for the country.

It was for the maintenance of the liberty of the world and of the union of its people in a single comradeship of liberty and of right, that "our men conscientiously offered their lives," the president asserted.

The message, eabled to the White House, reads: "Memorial day wears this year an added significance, and I wish it only by a message, to take part with you in its observation and in expressing the sentiments which it invariably suggests

DALLAS STORE ROBBED

Dallas, Ore., May 29.—The grocery and hardware store of C. L. Crider on Main street in this city was entered some time Monday night or nearly Tuesday morning and goods and money to the amount of about \$65 taken. The rob-

ber or robbers, for it is believed that more than one person did the trick, gained entrance to the building by forcing open a window in the second story. After helping himself to the contents of two cash registers the thief went through the gun case and took away a 16 gauge shotgun and several hundred shells. Other articles were also taken from the hardware department. It is the opinion of Sheriff John W. Ore that the robbery was committed by at least one of the parties that entered the Bee Hive store and the Ellis confectionery store here several weeks ago. One of that party was caught, and is now serving time in the state reformatory. The other member of the party was seen about McMinville, Monday and efforts made to capture him were unavailing.
