more than what was done in the past when the flu was a severe in the city, and that is, in quarantining the houses, but permitting all members of the families to mix with other people, thereby spreading the disease. There is a great shortage of nurses in the city. Many who are competent have gone to Portland and there are but few in the city excepting professional nurses regularly engaged in the hospitals here.

J. M. Waterbury, the marathon pianist, who attracted so much attention in the show window of E. L. Stiff & Son, was forced to discontinue his performance after playing continuously for 36 hours and 30 minutes. He went through yesterday all right and was going strong late in the evening when a swelling of the arm made it necessary for him to give up his attempt to break his former record of 65 hours. From the time Mr. Waterbury began his long piano solo until he quit, there was large crowds in front of the Stiff store closely watching him and passing various comments as to how it might feel to keep at a piano playing job so many hours.

This morning at about 7 o'clock the Falls City motor ran into an automobile at the crossing on the Wallace road just north of the Polk county end of the bridge. The car was thrown to one side of the road and pretty badly smashed but the two occupants were unhurt and managed to come into Salem. They were traveling south in a Washington car. The Falls City motor was delayed about half an hour for repairs.

Part of the work now being carried on by the local Red Cross is that of communicating with people in Germany and delivering and receiving letters. As there is no communication in the postal service with Germany, the only means of getting news is thru the Red Cross. Recently letters were received from Germany through the Red Cross by William Lubcke of Salem, Mrs. Selena of Mt. Angel and Mrs. M. Winkler of Second street, Salem, and William Hammer of Mt. Angel. Those sending letters to Germany are Mrs. John Stettin, John Stettin and Mrs. E. T. Schmidt, all of Salem.

Women and men who have given 600 hours service to the Red Cross since April 6, 1917, are entitled to wear a badge in the way of a service button with ribbon attachment. For each additional 600 hours of service, there is a star woven in the ribbon of the badge. To secure one of these badges it is necessary to fill out a questionnaire. The committee in Salem to pass on applications and recommend badges consists of Mrs. W. H. Dancy, Mrs. F. A. Elliott and Mrs. Russell Catlin. About 20 are entitled to wear the badge.

Something very much resembling the "flu" has broken out among the pupils of the Grant junior high school and in the primary grades.
