Submitted by the Legislature--SIX PER CENT COUNTY INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS AMENDMENT.--Purpose: To amend Section 10 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to raise the present 2 per cent limitation placed upon counties in the creation of debts and liabilities for permanent roads, to 6 per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the county. Submitted by the County Court--MARION COUNTY ROAD BOND ISSUE--Shall there be issued bonds by Marion County, Oregon, to the amount of eight hundred fifty thousand (\$850,000.00) dollars, due serially, the first installment of eighty-five thousand (\$85,000.00) dollars to be due and payable four years from the date of such bonds and each successive installment of eighty-five thousand (\$85,000.00) dollars to be paid annually each succeeding year from such date until the entire issue of eight hundred fifty thousand (\$850,000.00) dollars shall have been fully paid and redeemed, the last installment thereof being due and payable thirteen years from the date of such bonds, said bonds bearing interest at not to exceed the rate of five and one-half per cent per annum, to provide for permanent road construction, in Marion County. Always keep to the right of the center of the street and near the curb. Don't jam the gear shifting lever from low to reverse, or vice versa, until the car has come to a dead stop, and then take your time. A very simple way of cleaning valve stems while here under suspicion of having carbon deposit is to inject a little kerosene in the air valve of the carburetor while the engine is running. In this way a little of the kerosene floats it way down the valve stem and softens and washes off the carbon. It is no bad idea to do this once a month or so. CHINESE DEMONS FOR CELEBRATION



Tagging a Demon for Centenary Celebration

Demons of ferocious appearance, strange native idols and images of little-known gods have been gathered into a unique collection for the Methodist Centenary Celebration at Columbus, O., June 20 to July 18. Every figure is tagged and catalogued for full explanation to the throngs which will attend the big exposition this summer. Nightmarish as the two Chinese demons shown here appear, they are familiar figures to the natives who offer them gifts to appease their registered wrath. One, ranging in size from the enormous members to the little

household gods have been sent in from China, India, Korea, Japan, Malaysia and Africa by Methodist missionaries who have contributed to the diversified displays at the Centenary Celebration. Each figure is catalogued and tagged before being placed in the exhibit building to which it is assigned. Two women employees of the Celebration are shown here cataloguing the idols. The figure riding on a tiger is the foreground is not "the young lady of Niger," who went for a ride on a tiger, and who disappeared, leaving as the only clue "a smile on the face of the tiger." She is Kali, an avenging goddess of India, who always

is represented as wearing a necklace of her victims' heads draped about her shoulders. That this formidable goddess was revered properly in India is shown by the fact that the natives named after her their greatest city--Calcutta. Contrasted with the display of native deities, the Centenary Celebration has prepared exhibits showing the spread of Christianity to the lands where these idols were worshipped. Numerous exhibits and life dramas with native Christian demonstrators show how the gospel of Christ has been spread to the world in the 100 years of Metho-

PORTLAND LIVESTOCK MARKET

North Portland, Or., May 30.--The receipts of cattle the latter part of last week were about normal and prices steady. Yesterday's receipts were large same being more than the demand and prices took a drop of about 60. There was a fair proportion of all grades in the yards. Extra good steers sold from 12@13 1/2. A few sold for above, but not many. Good steers sold from 10 1/2@11 1/2; good stockers, 9@10; extra good cows brought 11; good cows selling for 9 1/2@10 1/2; medium, 7@9; stockers, 5 1/2@6 1/2.

There was a good demand for hogs and prices did not weaken any, same being from 6@8 on most of the sales. Prime veal calves brought from 12@12 1/2. The hog receipts last week were about normal and the prices the latter part of the week were steady to what they were the first of the week, yesterday's receipts were not as large as the Monday previous, but at the same time there was a good supply here. Prices were steady to strong. The top at 28c was the same as the latter part of last week, but there were more sales made at this figure. In fact, the bulk of sales for prime mixed hogs were at 28c. Stockers and feeders are still being taken care of in good shape. The receipts of sheep last week and yesterday were heavy. Prices last week remained steady, but at the same time it was hard to maintain them and the undercurrent showed a weakening, and on the large receipts yesterday the prices of wethers and yearlings broke 10@11 1/2; good wethers selling from 8@8 1/2; yearlings, 8@9. Lamb prices remained steady at 15c for prime lambs; quotations on good ewes 6@8c.
