Open Forum IN BEHALF OF BILL

Editor Capital Journal: Among the measures to be submitted to the voters of Oregon tomorrow is one which while it has not been discussed much in the press, so far as I have observed, is yet of vital interest to the progressive spirit of our state. That is the "Soldiers, Sailors, and Marines' Educational Relief Bill," No. 314 on the ballot, which provides for honorably discharged soldiers, sailors or marines, or those on furlough, financial aid not to exceed \$25 in any one month, nor \$200 in any one year, for a period not exceeding the next four years, to assist them in attending any institution of learning in the state of Oregon. It is to be hoped that every voter will carefully read the able argument in behalf of this measure in the official pamphlet sent to all voters.

To the present writer the outstanding reasons why this measure should be passed are two: 1.—It is to the interest of the state. Every one recognizes that the leaders of Oregon in the near future, those who will largely shape the fortunes and destinies of the state, are to be the boys who have passed through the perils and hardships and triumphs of the past two years. Many of them entered the army out of the school room, breaking abruptly the course of their education. Many find themselves after the lapse of the two years so situated, by reason of changing circumstances, that it will be very difficult for them to resume their courses in school, unless assisted. Moreover the call of active life will keep many from returning to school, unless this encouragement be given them. It is to the primary interest of the state that those who are to control its destinies should have the highest standard of education which the schools can furnish. If it is to our interest that schools, high school, and college should be maintained, how much more it is to our interest to give our returning soldiers, at this critical time of their lives, this relief while attending them.

2.—It is only rudimentary justice to the boys themselves. They have given two years out of the prime of their young manhood, most of them for about \$30 per month, out of which they had to pay their insurance, to say nothing of the risk of sickness, death or wounds, which actually came to many thousands, while those who remained at home received the abnormal wages which

times enabled them to command. Surely it is a small compensation for us now to offer the survivors this encouragement to complete their education.

Moreover this measure is in line with what other states and countries are doing. The British government, for instance, has arranged to grant scholarships to about \$500 (104 pounds) annually to discharged service men attending approved colleges. Let us not be satisfied merely with praising our boys and extolling their achievements. Let us give them their substantial life to fit themselves for their life-work.
