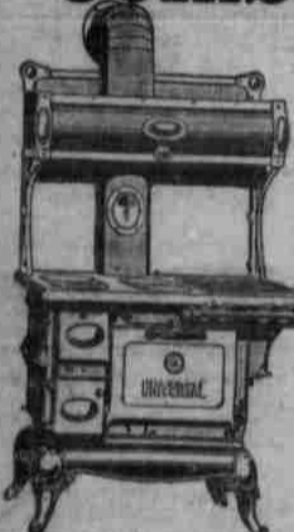

the Portland man as commissioner for the codification of the Oregon laws, as provided by act of the last legislature, which allowed an appropriation of \$3000 for the purpose. Work upon the code will be commenced at once, Attorney Olson making his headquarters at the office in Portland, though he will have an office also in the supreme court building and will spend a part of his time in Salem. In the work of making up the future volume of laws he invites cooperation and suggestions from attorneys of the state. The present code, known as "Lord's Oregon Laws" was made up by the late William P. Lord, a former governor of Oregon, in the year 1910. In the nine years that have elapsed a mass of new legislation has been enacted, and the number of remedial measures and amendments brought about in the interim makes it imperative that the laws be codified. The new volume will be known simply as the "Oregon Laws."

Polk County Approves Road Measures By Big Majorities

(Capital Journal Special Service.)
Dallas, Or., June 5.—Latest returns from the special election held Tuesday prove the effect that the \$265,000 road bonding measure for the permanent building of hard surfaced roads in Polk county has carried by a 10 to 1 vote. Little interest was shown in the election on other measures some of which were entirely overlooked the voters casting votes for only good roads measures. The Roosevelt Highway and the market roads measures also were carried by large margins. The vote was one of the lightest cast in Polk county in several years and was due mostly to the fact that practically every able bodied man in the county is busy with farm work or at work in orchards. The official count of the votes polled will be made by the county clerk either today or tomorrow.
