**WHEAT FROM AUSTRALIA**

Melbourne, May 10.—(By Mail.)—The Australian government has arranged the sale of 30,000 tons of wheat to India and 11,000 to England, according

to an announcement made by Senator Russell for the commonwealth. The price to India is about \$1.31 per bushel, e. o. d. Melbourne. The price to England, including all costs of shipment to the port of destination is \$2.31 per bushel.

**NEW BOOKS AT THE LIBRARY**

"Vanished halls and cathedrals of France," one of the most beautiful books the library has received, illustrated in colored plates with the story of his travel in France before the war, by George Wharton Edwards.  
 "Herself—Ireland," an enjoyable account of Irish temperament, and wit, the treasures of old Ireland, and the Ireland of today, related by Elizabeth O'Connor.  
 "American problems of reconstruction," a symposium on the many questions of efficiency in production, adjustments in trade and finance, and monetary and fiscal programs, written by men of authorized and edited by Elsha Friedman. Among the writers on their special subjects are Charles Schwab on "Steel," Louis Weis on "Capital and Labor," F. W. Taussig on "Tariff," Frank Nessler on "National Thrift," and Irving Fisher on "Stabilizing the Dollar."  
 "The great adventure" studies in American nationalism, the last book written by Theodore Roosevelt.  
 "Book of American wars" a clear account of our fighting record from our revolution—a fight for nationality through "The Spanish war—a fight for a weak neighbor" and leading up to

"1917—a fight for humanity," written by Helen Nicoday.  
 "Evolution of the Dominion of Canada," the national policy, the distribution of powers between the Dominion and provinces, and other general information on Canada, with special attention to comparison with the U. S. in politics, written by Edward Porritt.  
 "History of the World war, vol 3, Verdun and the Somme," by Frank Herbert Simonds. The library has the

earlier volumes of this set which is being written by this foremost war correspondent; two or three volumes will follow.  
 "My Antigua," a new novel by Wills Cather.  
 "Applesomeness of the Klukkat," reported to be a true story of the apple country of the northwest, by Anna Van Rensselaer Morris.  
 "Apartment next door," a mystery story of the detection of German spies by William A. Johnston.  
 During "Boy Scout Week" which has been proclaimed by President Wilson to begin on June 9, the library will have for distribution to all Boy Scouts the pamphlet "Books for Boy Scouts" which is the official list of scout books prepared by the Chief Scout Librarian. Any boy who does not receive one from his scout master may call at the library for it. For this week only, Boy Scouts will be put in a prominent place together where the scouts may see them and borrow for home reading. Almost all of the books listed in the pamphlet will be found there. It would be interesting to have each scout check up the list to find how many he has read from the official list.  
 A few new titles are being added this week both for boy and girl scouts:  
 "Tom Slade, boy scout," by Percy Fitzhugh.  
 "Tom Slade with the colors" by Percy Fitzhugh.  
 "Boys' book of mounted police" by Irving Crump.

"Girls scout of the Red Horse Troup," by Amy Blanchard.  
 "On the trail," an outdoor book for girls, by Lina Beard.
