Auto Stalled in McKenzie Pass Throughout Winter Is Still in Good Shape, Report

An automobile owned by a man at Bend, and which became stalled in the snow near the summit of the Cascades on the McKenzie pass road late last fall, and abandoned for the winter, is still where it was left by its owner, and is in good condition, according to George Moody, hunter and guide, of McKenzie bridge.

Mr. Moody a short time ago made a trip over the summit of the mountain by horseback and saw the car by the side of the road, still almost covered with snow. He examined it, and found that the owner had put up all side curtains, and on that account no snow or rain entered the car, and the "side" was quite dry, said Mr. Moody. The engine seemed to be in good shape, and the radiator had evidently been "filled" of water by the owner before he left. Mr. Moody says that he believes the car can be taken on to Bend under its own power after the snow melts but this will be several weeks yet, he thinks. He says that snow covers the road for 15 miles at the summit, and on either side, and that it is from 10 to 15 feet deep. On the Willamette side it is quite soft, he says, due to warmer weather than on the other side.

Alsea River.
Open between Corvallis and Waldport. In fair condition, Corvallis to Missou; Bend. Only passable between Missouri Bend and Waldport; very rough.

COURT HOUSE

In the case of Mary A. Stiffler vs. Albert S. Stiffler, Aratus Stiffler, L. C. Stiffler, Roy Stiffler and Oka Stiffler, the circuit court found as follows: That since Oct. 21, 1905, the plaintiff has been and is now owner of an estate for the term of her life, consisting of two acres in the city of Salem, just east of 1st and Chemsoketa street and of a 60 acre farm near Geer station. That the city of Salem opened Chemsoketa street through the two acre tract and that the plaintiff was awarded \$300 damages. That the defendant Albert C. Stiffler collected from the city the \$300 damages at the request of Aratus Stiffler, L. C. Stiffler, Roy Stiffler and Oka Larson and that he accepted the money as trustee for the plaintiff. That \$10 was paid to John Hayne for services. That the remaining \$290 was expended in permanent improvements on the property. That the plaintiff is entitled to a decree awarding her \$42.55 and costs from Albert C. Stiffler, and that Albert C. Stiffler is entitled to a decree and judgment against other defendants, barring them from claiming any part of the \$300.

CONDITION OF WESTERN OREGON ROADS

Barlow-Oak Grove.
Open and in fair condition, Portland to Twinbridges. Closed by snow, Twinbridges to Clear Creek. No detour possible. Open, Clear Creek to Wapinitia. Open and in fair condition, Wapinitia to Celanunna.
McKenzie Highway.
Open and in fair condition, Eugene to Blue River. Open, Blue River to Lost Creek Ranger station, but in poor condition. Closed by snow, Lost Creek Ranger station to summit.
Willamette.
Open and in fair condition, Eugene to Boulder Grade. Closed by snow between Boulder Grade and summit.
Grants Pass-Crescent City.
Open and in fair condition for entire length. For several miles between Kerby and Waldo and also for about four miles on the east side of Oregon Mountain, very rough.
Pacific Highway.
Open and in excellent condition, except where road construction is in progress between Medford and Riddle. Road is open to traffic at intervals during the day; traffic is held up part of the time, awaiting dynamite blasts. A section of road between Grants Pass and Rogue River is being paved and a detour on the north side of the river is necessary, over a rough road.
Crescent City-Gold Beach.
Open and in fair condition, Crescent City to Brookings. Open but rough, because of recent rains and grading, between Brookings and Gold Beach.
Roseburg-Prick.
Open and in good condition between Roseburg and Prick.
Medford-Crater Lake.
Open and in fair condition, Medford to National Park boundary. Closed by snow between Park boundary and Crater Lake. No detours possible. Probably will be open July 1st.
Auna Creek.
Open and in fair condition between Kinmonth Falls and two miles inside National Park line. Closed by snow from this point to Crater Lake. No detours possible. Will probably be open July 1st.
