Irrigation for 1919—The system of dividing the city into two districts which proved so satisfactory last year will be continued for the season of 1919. The houses which bear even numbers on the streets will irrigate only on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday, and the houses which bear odd numbers on the streets irrigate only on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. This plan will permit every house to irrigate four days out of every week. By strictly following this rule we are able to supply our patrons with the usual amount of water under more satisfactory conditions. Season irrigation bills will be discounted 10 per cent if paid on or before June 10th.—Salem Water, Light & Power Co. 6-10

A recent report issued by W. H. Bennett, superintendent of banks, shows that the banks of the state have increased their savings deposits by more than \$10,000,000 during the past year—an indication not only of general prosperity but of the fact that the people have been taught thrift during the war. The total deposits in the banks of the state amount to \$445,559,942, which represents an increase of about \$57,000,000 over the deposits at this time last year. Along with this goes the fact that there have been fewer cases of failure and embarrassment than at any time in recent years.

Owing to increased cost of labor and equipment, the Central Oregon Irrigation company has applied to the public service commission for permission to increase their service rates from \$1 per acre to \$2 per acre.

State Engineer Copper has recently been notified of the formation of a new irrigation district in the dryest section of Lake county. This is the Northern Lake county irrigation district, embracing about 30,000 acres, for which it is planned to divert water from the Sycuan river and Silver creek.

STATE HOUSE NEWS The appropriation to the several counties of the state of the moneys appropriated annually for county fairs, land product shows and the live stock expositions under the provisions of chapter 146 laws of 1913, was made by the legislature of state today. This law appropriates annually such a sum as may be raised by levying a tax of 1/20 of a mill upon the taxable property of the state as last equalized by the state tax commission, and is apportioned to the counties in such amounts as may be raised by levying a tax of 1/20 of a mill upon the taxable property of each county, except that no one county can receive more than \$15,000. Multnomah county is the only county of the state in which the 1/20 of a mill tax, on its taxable property, exceeds the maximum amount apportioned to each county. The amount apportioned to Marion county under this act is \$2173.16. Governor Glent has received a communication from the navy department stating that there are on hand at the navy yard in Washington 181 memorial tablets made from metal recovered from the battleship Maine, and that these tablets are to be disposed of in accordance with an act of congress, which provides that the tablets may be obtained by municipalities, military or naval organizations and former officers and crew of the Maine, or their heirs or representatives. The cost of the tablets, plus transportation charges will be about five dollars. Full information will be furnished to any applicants who are entitled to receive the tablets, on application to the navy department.
