40,000 Men Effected.

Chicago, June 10.—(United Press.)—Between 40,000 and 50,000 telegraphers will leave their keys at 8 a. m. tomorrow in answer to the call for a general strike, according to latest estimates in the hands of President S. J. Koenekamp, of the Commercial Telegraphers Union of America, here today.

Koenekamp said this number might be decreased in case settlements are reached with companies involved.

"I have no reason to anticipate settlement with any of the companies," Koenekamp said.

Reports that Clarence Mackey, president of the Postal Telegraph company and other associated companies, had sent a committee here to confer with him were declared by Koenekamp to be "news to him."

Koenekamp said the first break in the ranks of employers came last night when the Federal Telegraph company, a combination of wireless and wire systems on the Pacific coast and to Honolulu, signed the agreement granting the union demands.

It was estimated more than 6000 telegraphers will strike in Chicago alone.

"Three Rs" Not Neglected In Salem Schools, Report

There has been a general belief that in the broadening curriculum of the modern school system the "three Rs" were being sadly neglected. There is no ground for this belief in Salem, as can be shown by figures from the office of Miss Cooper, who has been placing special emphasis on these lines in the elementary grades. During the past year or two these studies have been built up until the fourth, fifth and sixth grades are making a most gratifying showing. This year special attention has been given to spelling, with very good results as shown in the final spelling tests. The average for the three grades in the different buildings is shown by Miss Cooper as follows:

Englewood—4th, 89.4; 5th, 90.1; 6th, 89.5; average for building 89.

Garfield—4th, 98.4; 5th, 99.3; 6th, 97.4; building 98.7.

Grant—4th, 96.3; 5th, 97; 6th, 97.4; building 96.9.

Highland—4th, 97.9; 5th, 98.5; 6th, 99.1; building 98.5.

Lincoln—4th, 97.8; 5th, 98; 6th, 98.6; building 98.1.

Richmond—4th, 98.9; 5th, 99.2; 6th, 99.5; building 99.2.

Park—4th, 99.2; 5th, 99.8; 6th, 97.9; building 99.7.
