WORLD'S RECORD IS BROKEN BY TANLAC

Elks Organize Woodburn For Salvation Army Fund

As a first move in the campaign of the Elks to raise the required quota of the county for the Salvation Army, a meeting was held last evening at Woodburn, when arrangements were made for a general mass meeting to be held at that place next Monday evening.

At this meeting the program will include singing by Mrs. Hallie Perrié and Chas. V. Galloway. Should Lieutenant Lamar Toose return from France by next Monday, he also will deliver an address. There will also be the Elks band.

Just to demonstrate airplane mail service, W. L. Toose, general manager of the campaign for the Salvation Army fund, gave Governor Gelett some advertising matter for the Monday night meeting, which was delivered in Woodburn 7 minutes after the start here. The package was dropped from an altitude of 2,000 feet.

It is understood that a number of Salem Elks are arranging to attend the Monday night Woodburn meeting.

Resignation Of Assistant Librarian Is Accepted By Board At Monthly Meeting

At the monthly meeting of the library board on Monday afternoon, the resignation of Mrs. Blanche Howard as first assistant was received. The board accepted the resignation with expressions of appreciation for the seven years of faithful service which Mrs. Howard has given to the library.

Other business transacted by the board concerned the charges of fines on overdue books. The fine of two cents a day on children's books was not altered, but the fine of five cents a day on adult books was reduced to two cents. An additional charge of five cents will be made when a notice of overdue books is mailed to the borrower.

Supreme Court Hands Down Only Three Minor Decisions

Only three decisions of minor importance were handed down by the supreme court this week. The case of State of Oregon vs. W. F. Moss was appealed from Harney county, Dalton Biggs judge. Decision by Judge John Sait was instigated because of alleged larceny of stock, the case being complicated with an agreement. The judgment of the lower court was sustained.

The case of Grant Chrome Co. vs. J. D. Marks, et al, was appealed from Grant county, Dalton Biggs judge. This was a suit in equity, the plaintiff claiming to be the assignee of a certain lease and option contract. It was alleged that plaintiffs did not fulfill their contract, that property was legally abandoned, and the contract was assigned to other parties. The judgment of the lower court was affirmed. Decision by Justice Bennett.

The case of Chauncey LeVee vs. Jacob LeVee was appealed from Benton county, G. T. Skipsworth judge. This was a suit to recover on contract, and which fraud is alleged. Court held that there was no prima facie evidence of fraud and the decision of the lower court was reversed. Decision by Justice Bennett.
