HURLEY VOICES PLEA FOR MERCHANT MARINE

Chairman Of Shipping Board Says Recruits Needed To Man Vessels.

Washington, June 12.—Chairman Edward N. Hurley, of the U. S. shipping board today issued the following appeal to the country for assistance in manning the new merchant marine, a task which he characterized as one of the pressing problems of the hour in the nation's economic readjustment to peace conditions: "The backbone of a merchant marine are the men who are in it. We must have the best obtainable crews for our new merchant ships. The need is pressing. American vessels in American ports today are calling for American crews—for mates, engineers, seamen, firemen, cooks and stewards who are American citizens."

It is as vital to the nation's prosperity that we have efficient American crews on the ships of the new merchant marine as it is for the railroads to have skilled and loyal train crews. Every American farmer, business man and manufacturer, is directly interested, in a business way, in seeing that this is done. It is his duty to help us secure efficient management at sea of the great fleet on which so much of the nation's money has been spent.

Our present greatest need is to get in touch with the American boys who should man these ships. The need is so urgent that I hope every newspaper in the country will take notice of it; that every preacher will mention it from his pulpit; that every city and town, through its officials, its chamber of commerce or other civic bodies, will make a canvas of the young men in the community who might be available for training as merchant mariners, with a view of becoming officers, or shipping agents or foreign trade representatives for American interests in the future.

The shipping board will give its fullest cooperation to any community wishing to send its boys for the merchant marine. Applicants for training will be directed to the nearest enrolling agent, of which the board has 3700. Those accepted will proceed to a seaport with out cost for railroad fare, which will be refunded to them by the board. They will be placed on training ships, on pay, put into uniform, and taught the fundamentals of their new trade before being sent to sea in merchant crews.

We want American boys from 18 years old up. We want them now, without a day's delay. We can take all of the right kind who come. We also want more mature material. Ex-service men are welcome, especially former navy men who are qualified by seagoing experience to become merchant marine officers. We will train such men in navigation, without cost to them, for second or third mate's licenses. We will also train high school graduates who have been one year at sea, for third mate's licenses. Third mates in the merchant marine are now earning an average of \$150 a month, with board and quarters free. Second mate average \$175 a month.

We also want to hear from machinists and engineers, and will train them, at the best technical colleges, for engineers' licenses in the merchant marine. We want to hear also from merchant marine officers who want a raise in rating. We will help them get it, with free instruction.
