\$1.00-A-YEAR WOMAN WHO TRAINED WOMEN WAR WORKERS, HONORED

As a token of their appreciation, the 2,500 girls and 75 U. S. army officers who participated in the activities of the U. S. Training Corps for Women at Washington, D. C., have presented Miss Susanna Crocort, commander of the Training Corps for Women, with a beautiful silver loving cup. The presentation occurred on the Ellipse near the White House and was witnessed by thousands of interested spectators.

Lieutenant Colonel Edward Clifford, Q. M. C., in charge of the Allotment Branch, War Department, office of the Director of Finance, in presenting the cup, said: "We are indebted to Miss Susanna Crocort of Chicago for this splendid celebration. Miss Crocort is one of those self-sacrificing war workers who came to Washington to do her part in winning our magnificent victory. She came here in July, 1918, at the urgent solicitation of the War Department, to help make the girls in the departments more contented and to benefit their conditions. She has done more to keep up the morale of the girls who came to Washington to do war work than any other person, and while the general public may not know this, those of us who are in charge of large departments realize what she has done toward keeping up the health and spirits of the girls here. On behalf of these young women it is my privilege and I consider it a great honor—to present to you, Miss Crocort, this loving cup as a token of their appreciation of the wonderful work you have done for them. When you go back to Chicago, this cup will ever be a reminder of the love and esteem felt for you by the young women of the United States Training Corps."

The U. S. Training Corps for Women is this summer expending its work by inaugurating a series of summer camps, outside the larger cities of the country where girls and women will be given setting-up exercises and drills for the upbuilding of their health.
