Spokane, Wash., June 16.—Under smiling skies, before a large crowd of spectators and on links in ideal condition, the championship tourney of the Pacific Northwest Golf association opened at the Spokane Country Club this morning with starts in the open championship. They started at 8 o'clock.

With Seattle making by far the largest representation, a total of 194 entries have so far been made. This is about half the number expected as the play progresses. Yesterday the links were dotted by groups of the best players in the northwest going over the ground in preparation for the tourney play.

News that the California delegation will not attend has caused disappointment. No definite news of the coming of Chandler Egan, Jack Neville and Douglas Grant has been received and this is regarded as eliminating these cracks from the championship play.

From all showings to date the contest for the C. H. Davis, Jr. trophy will be between the Seattle Golf Club, the Aberdeen Golf Club and the Jefferson Park Club of Seattle.

BURLESON PROPOSES (Continued from page one)

By Alvin E. Johnson, (United Press staff correspondent.) Atlantic City, N. J., June 16.—Postmaster General Burleson's order to the telephone companies to negotiate with their employees, so as to avert the threatened electrical workers strike, was one of the most engrossing topics discussed by American Federation of Labor convention delegates today.

Burleson's order will only postpone the crisis, according to Thomas F. Herlihy, of the postal workers. He predicted the companies and the workers would be at loggerheads again when the wires are returned to their owners.

LONG Session. Yet "If the employees find they have been 'double crossed' in the words of Frank McNulty, international president of the electrical telephone workers, 'our action will be more determined than ever.'"

The convention today was to receive a full report of the telephone situation. It was considered probable, as the second week of the session opened, that the convention would have to sit perhaps ten days longer. A mass of resolutions confront the delegates.

TIMBERMAN DIES W. A. Reynolds, a prominent lumberman of this city, passed away at his home on Mill street, Wednesday evening about five o'clock, following a protracted attack of paralysis. Mr. Reynolds up to two years ago was prominently identified with the Silverton Lumber Co., an active head and was a man in whom all who came in contact with him had the greatest confidence. He took a prominent part in city affairs and served for six years on the board of Water Commissioners. He was Mayor of the city one term. He was a member of the Masonic order, also the K. of P.

Mr. Reynolds was born in Kansas City, Mo., September 11, 1869. Went from there to Mountain Home, Idaho, where he lived continuously until coming to Silverton in 1906. In October 1917 he suffered a stroke of paralysis and had been unable to take an active interest in business since.

Mr. Reynolds is survived by his wife and one son Charles of the Colquhoun and McChaine banks, also one sister, Mrs. Win. Service of this city. —Silverton Appeal.
