### DREAM OF CANADIAN LABOR PARTY FIFTY YEARS TOO PREVIOUS

Half Century Must Elapse Before Workers Can Get Together, Declares Cabinet Member.

Winnipeg, Man., June 18.—(United Press.)—It will take fifty years for labor in Canada to realize its dream for a strong party of its own in the councils at Ottawa, according to Senator Gideon Robertson, federal minister of labor, in an interview with the United Press today.

The big stumbling block to labor, he said, is the farmer. Organized labor and the agricultural workers, he pointed out, are diametrically opposed on the economic question.

"Labor stands for higher wages and the lower cost of foodstuffs," Robertson said. "The farmer wants more for his products and lower wages for his help. Consequently the workers in the cities and the farmers are constantly at odds."

"The agricultural workers control 75 percent of the electoral districts in Canada. You can readily see that labor is therefore unable to elect representatives in sufficient numbers to count. Personally, I believe that labor cannot hope to achieve anything like a strong representative faction for fifty years."

Robertson denied that the price of foodstuffs is being held up by artificial means. Charges that Winnipeg's great storage facilities were strained to the utmost in the hope of trade with Germany, Austria and other European countries, was characterized by the minister as silly.

"They talk of the immense quantities of butter in storage," he said. "If what is stored were divided equally, every person in Canada would have less than three fourths of a pound. The same is true of eggs and other foodstuffs."

"Milk, butter, eggs and other farm produce are high because it costs the farmer more to produce them."

Although the convention yesterday defeated the resolution calling for a strike in behalf of Tom Mooney, under sentence of life imprisonment for the San Francisco bomb outrage in 1916, the International Workers Defense League announced today it will go through with its strike program.

Deutschauser, delegate of the Detroit Central Labor Council, predicted 25,000 would strike there July 4. Duncan asserted 60,000 would quit in Seattle. W. B. Patterson, of the carpenters and builders of Oakland, Cal., declared thousands in California would walk out.

Upon recommendation of the committee on international affairs, debate on the league of nations covenant has been postponed until Friday afternoon.

The federation education committee which has been studying school systems over the country during the last year reported that American boards of education in "an alarming number of cities" have forgot they are servants of the people. Unions were urged to exert a greater influence in the conduct of the schools.
