The stage of the river today is just where it was on January 9 of this year when the record read 9 above the low water mark. For the benefit of those who are under the impression that it always rains in June and that we are breaking the record this year with the lack of moisture, it may be said that not a drop of rain fell in Salem during June of one year ago. So far this month there has been a precipitation of only .8 of an inch. It doesn't rain very much in this valley in June. For the year 1917 the rainfall was only 1.15 inches during the month, and in 1916 it was only 1.31 inches. For 1915 it was 1.11 inches, in 1914 the record shows 1.77 inches. But for June of 1913 the wet record for the month was broken with a rainfall of 3.48 inches.

In the suit of the Phez company against J. E. Gansley for \$130 damages in not delivering his 1918 crop of log-ganberries, Judge Kelly ordered the jury to find for the Phez company. The amount of damages sustained was left for the jury to decide, and this was fixed at \$101.71 instead of the \$180 sued for. Mr. Gansley had contracted with the Phez company to deliver berries at three cents a pound with 1 1/2 cents a pound damage should he fail to fulfill his contract. The Phez company sued on the basis of 1200 pounds contracted for, \$180, but the jury placed the damages at about one cent a pound.

Actual work on the half million paper mill to be erected by the Spaulding interests began yesterday. This consists of levelling down the foot of Trade street vacated by the city council and filling in parts of the river front for the erection of a sulphite mill and also for the power house.
