land their effort to get in touch with American officials and employees in Chihuahua and order them to concentrate in the larger Mexican towns for protection.

Bandit Leaders Split

Laredo, Texas, June 19.—Possibility of a split between General Felipe Angeles and Pancho Villa was foreseen today following private advices from Mexico saying Villa planned a campaign of reprisals against American forces.

Angels in northern Mexico because of United States intervention at Juarez. Well informed travelers arriving today said the opinion was general thru out northern Mexico Villa will show no mercy toward Americans. The bandit chief is said to have expressed bitter disappointment over the outcome of his attack on Juarez, declaring his forces would have taken the city within a few hours if American troops had not interfered.

Angels on the other hand, is said to have opposed the attack upon Juarez on the ground that it would be sure to incur American enmity to the rebel cause. Angeles has sent word to American mining concerns in Chihuahua, according to the travelers, that he will live up to his manifesto promising protection to all foreigners, despite the Juarez incident. If Villa, who signed the manifesto with Angeles refuses to live up to it, a split is sure to follow, it was declared.

Travelers from Chihuahua City said rail communication had been interrupted for several days and the city was

in fear of a Villa attack. Villa and Angeles are now said to have established headquarters in the mountains of Chihuahua, planning a series of scattered attacks on the small Carranza garrisons away from the border. The travelers generally expressed complete confidence in Angeles' integrity and fairness.

Striking Telegraphers Confident Of Outcome

Chicago, June 19.—(United Press)—Striking telegraphers here today expressed utmost confidence in the outcome of the conference between Deputy International Vice President Percy Thomas and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, regarding an adjustment of the situation.

President S. J. Kenenlamp said reports from all parts of the country continued encouraging.

44 NORMAL STUDENTS ARE GIVEN DIPLOMAS

Commencement Speaker Tells Graduates Teaching Of Loyalty Paramount.

Oregon Normal School, June 19.—Forty-four young men and women yesterday received their diplomas from the Oregon Normal School, at the annual June commencement exercises. Many of the graduates have already secured positions in the various schools of the state and some of them will start their work immediately.

Judge Wallace McCamant of Portland delivered the address to the graduating class. He defined commencement as the time when the graduate commences to make practical use of the knowledge he has acquired in school. Judge McCamant urged the graduates who will take positions as teachers to let no child graduate from the elementary school without knowing the value of his heritage and the duty of citizenship. He told the graduates to teach the child to be loyal to the country, for "the flag is our symbol of authority," he said.

Arley C. Hampton speaks. The annual programme and banquet yesterday evening were largely attended. Arley C. Hampton, president of the state teachers' association and superintendent of schools at La Grande, spoke. He advocated that a change be made in the school system. expected to take up the question of Austrian finances and reparation today. There was no indication when the remainder of the Austrian treaty would be presented.

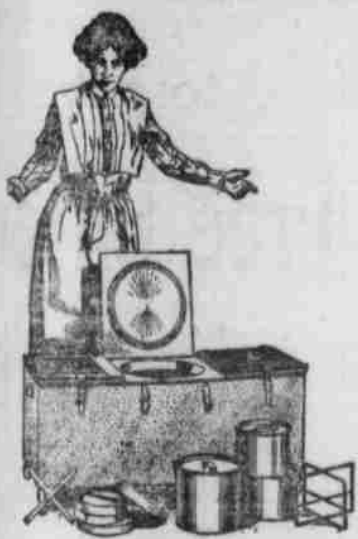
