

Ohio Legislature Asked To Call Halt On Battle

Columbus, Ohio, June 19.—Representative Dunn today will ask a reconsideration vote on his bill designed to interfere with the Dempsey-Willard championship bout. The house last night defeated the measure by a narrow margin.

Protection Of Lives And Property On Border Urged

Springfield, Ill., June 19.—(United Press.)—Protection of lives and property of American citizens on the Mexican border was demanded of the federal government today by the state legislature in a joint resolution introduced before the senate.

The resolution declared law-abiding citizens have been killed, their homes raided and property destroyed, and sets forth that the United States has ample forces at its disposal.

The recommendation adopted by the board includes an extensive programme, covering bunkhouses, water supply, camp site, bathhouses, dry rooms, latrines, mess halls, meat houses, kitchens, sanitary service and recreation. Bunkhouses must be provided with a minimum of 50 square feet floor space for each man and 500 cubic feet of air space.

They must be raised from the ground at least two feet, and in damp situations more. They must be adequately heated by steam hot water or stoves. A minimum of one shower head for each 15 men is recommended, with separate controls for hot and cold water. Dry rooms are not required east of the cascades. The camp superintendent is held strictly responsible for the sanitation of the camp.

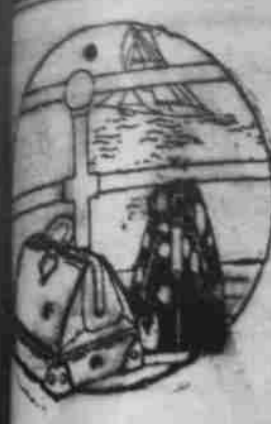

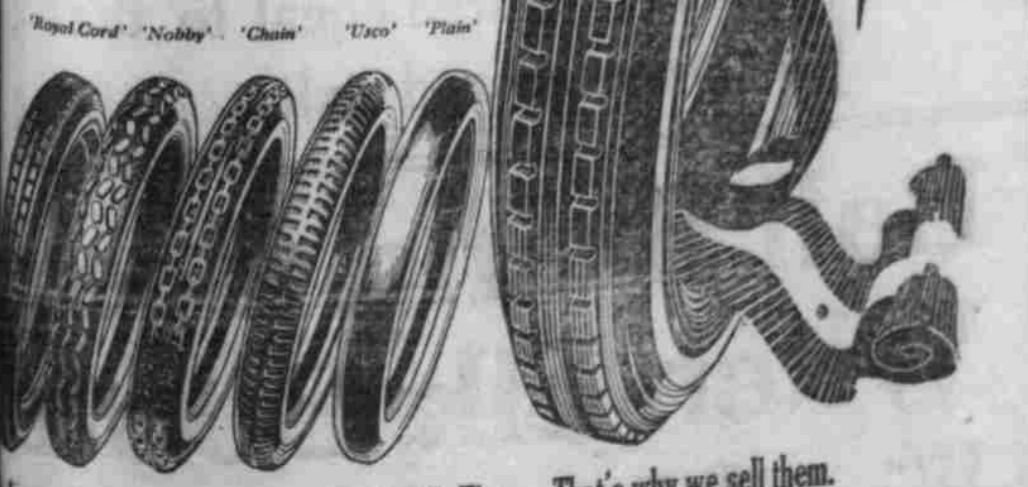

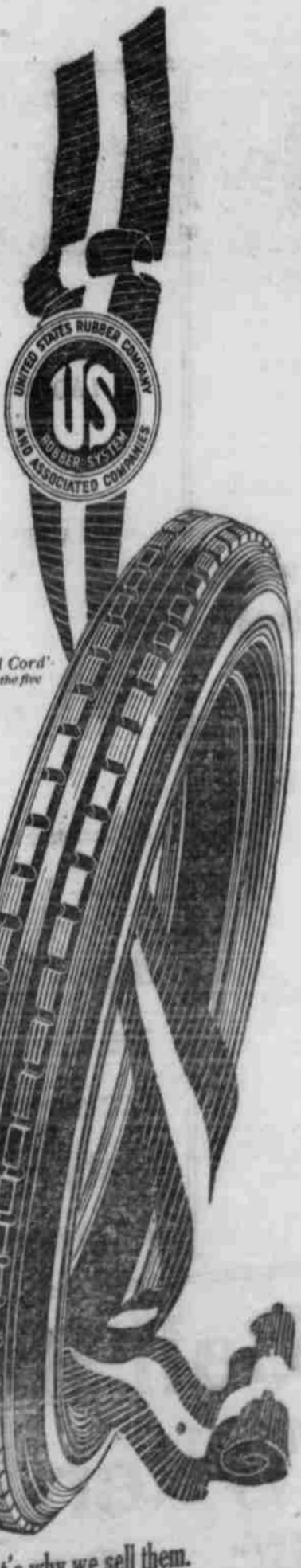
