\$1 Coffee Likely to Appear in A Few Days

DOLLAR a pound coffee at retail is a possibility of the near future. Today the market is the highest it has ever been in the history of the trade and additional advances are appearing as certainties, ranging anywhere from 10 to 20 cents a pound over prevailing quotations. This morning in Brazil there was an advance equal to 2 cents a pound while in New York the market scored the biggest jump in years. It has now reached the point where coffee is at the highest price in history. Lang & Co., wholesale grocers, in making the announcement, stated there is a shortage of millions of bags in Brazil which had only about a one third crop. This fact, together with the enormous advances already made in Brazil and New York which have carried the market here up some 18 cents a pound, lead them to the belief that there will be an advance of from 10 to 20 cents here any day. They further stated that there was a strong possibility that coffee prices would go to \$1 a pound in the not distant future.
