**BAUER IS CHANCELLOR OF NEW HUN CABINET**

Erzberger, Mueller, Noske and David Given Posts in Ministry.

Berlin, June 22. (United Press)--Germany's new cabinet was announced today as follows:

Gustav Adolph Bauer, chancellor. Hermann Mueller, minister of foreign affairs. Dr. Eduard David, minister of the interior. Mathias Erzberger, minister of finance and vice chancellor.

Herr Wissel, minister of economics. Herr Schlieke, minister of labor. Herr Meyer, minister of the treasury.

Johann Giesberth, minister of posts and telegraphs. Dr. Bell, minister of communications and minister of colonies. Gustav Noske, minister of defense. Herr Schmidt, food controller. General Groener, General Maercker and General Von Luttwig, commanders of the German volunteer army, sent messages to Weimar, advising that the treaty be signed.

Internal disturbances were growing as the political situation cleared in Weimar. Resignation of independent socialist officials in Brunswick was regarded here as foreshadowing further labor trouble.

The railway strike, which had spread to all parts of Germany was expected to become a general strike. Food depots were being plundered in Mannheim. Dispatches from that city said that two persons had been killed and fifty wounded.

In Kassel many casualties resulted from plundering and rioting. Marshal Fush has sent a note to the German armistice commission in Spa, asking that further advance of German troops in Esthonia be prevented and demanding immediate evacuation of Windau, Libau and all parts of the former Russian empire.
