CHERRY PRICES HOLD AROUND 10-CENTS

One Pool Of Loganberries Brings Nine Cents But 8 Is Steady.

With half a dozen firms in Salem bidding for cherries, the price today seems to have settled on 10 cents for Royal Annes and from nine to 10 cents for Bings and Lamberts. One house is quoted as paying ten cents for all kinds of cherries. It is understood that in a few instances the figure has run a trifle higher than ten cents but this is the average market price today.

Loganberries are quoted on an average at eight cents a pound. One pool covering the yield of 140 acres was sold a few days ago to the Drager company for nine cents with certain attached conditions. But the price as quoted today by almost all of the buyers is still on an eight cent basis for average fruit.

Blackberries it is thought will open at eight cents a pound. Only a few firms are quoting prices but the eight cents seems to be established for the opening of the market.

There seems to be no trouble in getting pickers. Reports to the U. S. employment bureau indicate that the big loganberry tracts, such as Bruce Cunningham and those close in to town, will have no difficulty in finding pickers at two cents a pound. This appears to be the established price, with no strings attached as last year when two cents was paid only when pickers agreed to remain with one tract during the entire picking season.

COURT HOUSE NEWS

In the suit of J. A. Moxley against Jake Moser, it took the jury but a few minutes to decide in favor of Mr. Moser. This was a case in which Mr. Moxley accused Mr. Moser of killing sheep. Mr. Moser, who lives six miles east of the city on the Garden Road, says most emphatically that he not only has never killed sheep but that he has always been most careful in handling them.

In the matter of the estate of Hazel A. Fox and Harry E. Fox, the county court has appointed Walter Beardsley, N. E. Abbott and W. L. Marsh as appraisers. The estate is valued at about \$400.

The estate of Rebecca Caroline Wright has been appraised at \$2000. Fred W. Wright is the administrator.

Prices At Bend Sale Set New Record For Wool Here

Bend, Or., June 25.—The highest price paid in the state this year for range sheep fleeces was given today at the sale held by the Central Oregon Wool Growers' association, the first to be held in Bend for three years, when the American Woolen Mills of Boston, through their agent, Alex Livingston, paid \$4 1/4 cents a pound for the 3744-pound clip of John Atkinson.

Earlier in the day the price had been run up to 53 1/2 and 54 cents, each being Oregon records for the year.

Fifteen buyers were on hand from Boston, Portland, Salt Lake and Pendleton, but the greater part of the total of 420,515 pounds sold went to supply eastern mills. More than 600,000 pounds were offered, and a number of deals are still pending. Virtually all the wool taken was fine staple.

The Salem Star is a new monthly publication edited and printed in Salem for the Deaconess home and hospital. The office of publication is 1118 Oak street and F. B. Wedel is editor. It is devoted to the interests of the Deaconess hospital with special articles written and signed by the friends of Mr. Wedel. In making a report of the Deaconess hospital for the month of May the following statistics are given: Number of patients cared for 74; operations performed 31; babies born at the hospital 4; accidents cared for 3 and medical cases cared for 36. Mr. Wedel announces that the Salem Star will be published monthly and will be devoted not only to the interests of the Deaconess hospital but to sending out good news regarding the Willamette valley.

The temperature for this part of the state has not changed to any extent during the past 25 years, notwithstanding the fact that it is frequently claimed that weather changes are in progress. According to the Climatological Data, just published with the report for May by Edward L. Wells, meteorologist and weather observer for Oregon, the average mean temperature for last month was 54.9 and this is a fair average since 1890 when records were first kept of the northwest. During all this time the highest mean temperature was 58 and the lowest 50 with the average the same as the past month. Taking an average for the western part of the state, May of 1919 had a rainfall of 2.99 inches which again is an average since 1890. This high average for western Oregon is due of course to the heavy rainfall along the coast as the precipitation in Salem for May was only .81 of an inch.
