### Wire Systems Not To Go Back To Owners For Month

Washington, June 25.—(United Press)—Telegraphic and telephone lines will not go back in the hands of the owners before July 31, action of the house and senate conference on the wire control bill indicated today. Agreement has been reached on the house provision that the lines shall go back at the end of the calendar month in which the act is approved. Conferees are certain the report cannot be approved by both houses and reached the president in time for his signature before July 1. The president probably would delay signing until after July 1, so that the confusion or a hasty and immediate return would be avoided. Telephone companies under the terms of the bill are given four months to lower rates in agreement with state and local utility commissions.

### "CANADA IS PAR GOLF," SAYS CHAMPION EVANS



"Canadian golfers are hard to beat, but Canadian hospitality cannot be beaten," declared Charles ("Chick") Evans, Jr., amateur and open champion golfer of the United States, after he had returned from the Hamilton and Searborough Golf Clubs. Canadian experts in these clubs had compelled him to play his best to win, and then both clubs had made him a life member. "Canada, in my opinion," he added, "is par golf."

About the middle of June Evans hopes to make his fifth trip to Canada to play for the benefit of the Canadian Red Cross. Other noted golfers who may go along are Francis Oulmet, Jerome D. Travers and John G. Anderson. The cities visited will be Montreal, Ottawa, St. Andrews-by-the-Sea and Toronto. Canada has a string of well-planned golf courses from the Atlantic to the Pacific, ranging from seaside links at St. Andrews-by-the-Sea on the Bay of Fundy to the Banff Springs Golf Club, Alberta, where the golfer can play his game at an altitude of nearly a mile. Going farther west he can play the Vancouver and Victoria golf clubs where the altitude is not far above the sea and where the golf sharp can play the royal and ancient game every month in the twelve, because the Japan current decreases that there shall be no "winter killed" greens.
