FATHER AND DAUGHTER PRINCIPALS IN LAWSUIT

John B. Holman Seeking To Recover \$400 Loaned To Carolyn Meyers.

The suit of John B. Holman against his daughter, Mrs. Carolyn Meyer of San Francisco, occupied the time of the circuit court in Judge Kelly's department this morning. Mr. Holman brought suit for \$400 which he advanced his daughter several years ago. To raise the money at that time he placed a \$400 mortgage on the lot just south of the Salem high school, which was in 1916 sold to the Salem school district.

Mr. Holman claimed that his daughter had never repaid him, and when the lot was sold in 1916, the \$400 was deducted from the amount he received.

On examination this morning Mr. Holman vigorously objected to the lawyers attempting to confuse him. He acknowledged to being 51 years of age but stated that he knew what he knew and that in many important matters he had kept a memorandum and that was positive regarding the facts he had testified to.

This suit was brought on to some extent by the suit of the Salem school district in condemnation proceedings to secure title to the entire lotman lot for school purposes. This suit came up for trial this afternoon.

Carolyn Meyer, early this year, gave a trust deed to Dr. Mark Shiff for \$800 to the lot in question. The city also has several hundred dollars due it in delinquent street improvement taxes against the lot. The school district bought the lot for \$325 but in the answer filed by Dr. Shiff and Carolyn Meyer it is claimed that the lot is worth \$500.

A sport committee of A. H. Moore, chairman, Lloyd Ramsden and Harry Scott, has been appointed to arrange for bicycle races and such to be assigned an hour during the afternoon.

During the Fourth of the War Mothers will provide special entertainment for the returned soldiers, and during the entire three days there will be the Browning Amusement feature. This will extend along Church street from State to Court and then around on Court street west for a block or so. And for those who dance and were brought up that way, there will be dancing on Court street from the Court annex to Church street.

CELEBRATION BOARD WILL MEET TONIGHT

Committee in Charge of 4th Program Will Complete Plans.

At a meeting of the general committee appointed to handle the great Fourth of July celebration in Salem, called for this evening, a definite program will be outlined.

With the War Mothers in charge of the reception Thursday evening, July 5, the Fourth of July committee will devote itself to the events of the great day.

Plans as tentatively outlined include a parade during the morning hours, to include floats, members of the Third National National Guard of Oregon, industrial float and a number of other interesting features, enough to make it entirely different from the ordinary street parade.

Then of course there will be the airplane stunts over the city for each of the three days and the privilege of taking a cross country ride up in the air for those who want the flight had enough to contribute \$10.

Besides the parade on the morning of the Fourth, the other especially attractive feature will be the baby parade around Wilson park and a special showing of the war babies, of which Salem has a number.

The orator of the day will be Justice Lawrence T. Harris, who will speak during the hour assigned him by the program committee. Then there is to be a concert in the afternoon at Marion Square for the special benefit of tired mothers and other folks who are just worried from straggling around and who would like to rest to the strains of sweet music. This afternoon program will also include a band concert by the famous Cherrias band.

For the evening, there will be an exhibition of folk dances of 45 minutes or an hour, put on by Mrs. Ralph White and her people of all ages, mostly young. This part of the program will be at Wilson Park while the fountain is playing in colors.

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The fireworks for the evening of the Fourth will be sent skyward either from the roof of the Masonic Temple or from Wilson Park.

Of course the Fourth is a national holiday and this will close all banks, the postoffice, all county and state offices, along with the business houses of the city.
