STATE HOUSE

What will prove an eye-opener all along the line of highway construction...

The Blake-Compton company entered a bid of \$152,812 for this unit, specifying a five-inch surface of asphaltic-concrete.

The state highway commission has recently called for bids on a reinforced concrete bridge over Pass Creek on the Pacific highway, about 3 miles south of the Lane-Douglas county line.

Governor Olcott today appointed the state board of engineering examiners, created by an act of the last legislature.

Deputy Secretary Koser recently received from Attorney John W. Kaste, of Portland, a communication warning him not to issue a warrant for the salary of George Tazwell, of Multnomah county, acting in the capacity of circuit judge; giving as a reason for such warning that the law by which Mr. Tazwell was elevated from the county court to the circuit court was invalid, and further warning that if Deputy Koser issued from the office of secretary of state any such warrant he would be held personally accountable for the misappropriation of state funds.

This letter was referred by Mr. Koser to the attorney general, who, in passing upon the matter, states the general principle that any officer placed in position by law must be considered as an official defacto until the law by which he is seated has been demonstrated by due process of the highest tribunal to be invalid and unconstitutional.

He holds, therefore, that Deputy Koser assumes no liability in issuing such warrant, and is not called upon to take any action with regard to the demand of the Portland attorney unless he deems it advisable to secure a decision from the supreme court.

The state highway commission will hold a conference this afternoon with Governor Olcott with regard to the appointment of a successor to Wm. L. Thompson, of Pendleton, who has identified himself with the First National bank of Portland and who will sooner or later leave Pendleton for the metropolis. Mr. Thompson is willing to remain as a member of the commission for several months in order to see the road program carried out in his district, but has placed the matter in the hands of the governor. Already a number of candidates for the position have been suggested, among them J. H. Burgess and Roy Ritter, of Pendleton; Wm. Hollman of Baker, Robt. N. Hirstfield of Stanfield, Fred Holmes of La Grande and Marcus A. Mayer of Molier.

Governor Olcott has just received the following telegram from Captain J. C. Rivers, state chairman, the American Legion, Portland, Oregon: "The American Legion which is the national organization of former service men soldiers, sailors and marines, pledges you full support of both national organization and the women in this state in efforts to maintain one hundred per cent Americanism based on law and order. This support is particularly pledged you and all those associated with you for good government on this first Independence day after having finished the job for which we entered our country's service."

In reply thereto Governor Olcott has sent the following wire: "Please accept my deepest appreciation for offer of co-operation and support of American Legion in advance."
