### CITY NEWS

Dr. Carl G. Doney leaves tomorrow for Cottage Grove where he will deliver the address of his Fourth of July relection.

Miss Lida Fike of Milwaukee, Wis., arrived in the city today and has been a visitor at Willamette university. She is a graduate of Milwaukee-Dowser college and will have charge of the domestic science department at Willamette next year.

A group of about a dozen chautauqua people arrived in the city this morning en route for the assembly at Silverton.

Miss Jane V. Doyle, R. N., of Portland, has been appointed as a member of the state board of examination of graduate nurses to succeed Miss Hazel Butler, of Portland, who recently handed in her resignation.

The state land board has approved the transfer of the stock properties and rights of the Morson Land company to the Walker Basin Irrigation company. The combined projects have an aggregate of 27,000 acres of irrigable land. Construction work on the west unit is already under way under the direction of George W. McLaughlin, of Leucostates county. This unit comprises 10,000 acres and the work is to be completed by October of this year.

The promoters of the Teal Irrigation company are expected at the capital today for a conference with the land board with regard to the certification of the bonds of that district. It is considered probable that the bonds will be approved by the board, and immediately thereafter two large contracts of construction will be let.

The board of control has recently finished the big task of awarding bids on supplies for the various state institutions, which entailed an immense amount of clerical work and investigation. The lists include almost everything known to civilized life in the line of eatables, utensils, tools, fabrics and furnishings, and the totals run high in to the hundreds of thousands of dollars. There is a possibility of comparing the figures with former years, but in the main there will be a heavy increase over former budgets.
