NEW CHAMPION TO GO ON VAUDEVILLE STAGE TO GATHER IN COIN

Prize Fight Fans Say Dempsey Actually Won Battle In First Round.

Toledo, Ohio, July 5.—Champion Jack Dempsey's first move will be on the vaudeville or burlesque stage, he told friends here today.

Jess Willard, giant, from whom he wrested the world's heavyweight title in one of the most one-sided fights of history, rested, his guard up against those who would pry into what happened to him in the ring.

There were rumors all night long that Jess had suffered a broken jaw, but he sent roundabout word to the United Press that this was a mistake. He did not admit that he lost any teeth, but Dempsey said he saw him spit three on the canvas of the ring.

Criticism was directed at just one feature of the bout. The timer, it was declared, was not the experienced man he should have been. Otherwise, the bell at the end of the first round would have been heard plainly. A whistle was provided him, but this was after the wild first round had been fought.

"I believe Dempsey won the championship twice," declared Jack Kearns, manager of the new champion. "Ollie Peacor not only helped Willard to his corner after he had counted him out, but also lifted Jack's hand in the air. Of course, I reached the conclusion that the fight was over and tried to hustle Jack out of the ring."

Toledo had quieted today. Most of those who came here to attend the big bout had gone away. The town was getting back to normal condition in slow fashion, but on street corners groups of men could be still seen arguing over the round in which Jess Willard, floored for the first time by a punch, went down six times from Jack Dempsey's blows.

Dempsey probably will leave Toledo tomorrow night. His eyes are set on a fat theatrical contract and one good offer has come from Cincinnati. He also expects to touch in Pittsburg and other big cities on his way to New York.

It is quite probable that Dempsey will meet George Carpentier in his next bout. Offers have been made for this, both in this country and abroad. Kearns declared some time ago that efforts would be made to get Carpentier to consent to a battle.

Willard plans to go to New York before going back to Kansas.

Rickard Is Sore

Toledo, Ohio, July 4.—Tex Rickard, promoter of the Willard-Dempsey heavy weight championship battle here, was bitter today in his criticism of the United States Railroad administration, which he said, kept 20,000 persons from the huge arena he had built in Bay View park.

Rickard declared he received reports all day yesterday from towns near Toledo, giving him word that many hundreds were being kept from the fight because the government was refusing to place enough coaches at the disposal of the fight fans.

"I was told that there was plenty of available rolling stock," he said, "but that persons in charge refused to give the orders to put it in use for those who wanted to see the bout."

"I figure I lost 20,000 patrons because of this stupid occurrence," Official figures on attendance and receipts, it was expected would not be available until late today, but Rickard made a rough guess at the crowd and placed it between 45,000 and 50,000. He said he had not lost money, but would come out with a nice profit.

The blow that fell yesterday from action of the railway administration was the second that struck the promoter. Early in the preparations it was stated special trains would not be provided and efforts to get this order knocked out occurred some days ago. Several trains probably were withheld by prospective losers because of the order.

Record books will show that Dempsey became champion of the world through a knockout of Jess Willard in three rounds, the fourth round not having started when the Willard sponge hit the ring.

Seven Bodies Taken From Lake Madison

Siox Falls, S. D., July 5.—(United Press.)—Seven bodies have been removed early today from Lake Madison, following the overturning of a pleasure launch during a fireworks display late last night. The launch struck a snag and immediately sank. Spectators today said probably a score went down with the boat.

Spectators said there were at least 30 in the launch and declared it was overcrowded. The screams of the occupants as they were hurled into the water brought motor launches from all parts of the lake to the rescue. It is not known how many were taken out of the water alive.

Sergeant Joseph Marquette Drowned in Lake Erie

Toledo, Ohio, July 5.—A United States balloon in scouting over Lake Erie for Sergeant Joseph Marquette, balloon pilot, believed drowned when a captive balloon in which he was operating over Bay View arena, scene of the Willard-Dempsey battle, broke its cable and floated over the lake.

Three Men Killed And Three Others Injured

Seattle, Wash., July 5.—Dashing directly in front of an Everett interurban car last night, three men were killed and two others probably fatally injured when their automobile was crushed to kindling by the big street car.

The dead are: Ed Jones, seaman, Fred W. Cristofferson, longshoreman, A. N. Anderson.

The injured: S. Swanson and Harry Sumner, longshoremen.

The auto was traveling at a high speed approaching the interurban trucks. Jones is believed to have seen the car too late, for skid marks in the ruts on the street show that he applied his brakes vigorously.

Parts of the machine and belongings of its occupants were found half a block from the crash.

Try Salem First In Buying

Telephone Strike May Be Settled Soon

San Francisco, July 5.—Relief from the telephone strike is expected shortly following the receipt of telegrams here yesterday from J. P. Noonan, president of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

Noonan, who is conferring at Washington with Assistant Postmaster General Koons and G. S. McFarlane and Horace Pillsbury, representatives of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company requested that the full wage demands of striking telephone operators be sent him immediately.

Simultaneously with this request, Miss Julia O'Connor, president of the telephone operators division of the brotherhood, was called to Washington, where it is believed she will participate in the conference.

Four fine trucks were received by the Lewis county commissioners last week from Chicago. They were assigned to the county to be used in road construction.
