Roberts Denies Violation Of Contract; Disposal Of Farm Cause Of Confusion

E. E. Roberts, who has been sued by the Phe company for the non delivery of loganberries, states, through his attorney that the suit is all a mistake. Mr. Roberts claims that he had delivered and was delivering to the Phe company his berries, but that he sold his place last week and that the new owner felt he should not be obliged to deliver berries at 5 1/2 cents to the Phe company while the market price was 9 cents. While this matter of adjusting prices was under discussion, and even while a truck load of Mr. Roberts' berries was on the way to the Phe company, the sheriff arrived with the summons in the suit. Mr. Roberts further states through his attorney that he did not inform the Phe company that he would refuse to deliver to them according to his contract. That he was delivering right along until he said out. It is also stated that the new owner of the Roberts tract made a compromise with the Phe people between the 5 1/2 cent contract and the 9 cent market price by which he is to receive 7 1/2 cents for the crop of almost seven tons of loganberries.
