President's Message To Congress Nearly Ready

By Lowell Mellett (United Press correspondent) Aboard U. S. S. George Washington, July 6.—(By wireless to the United Press)—President Wilson's message to congress was practically completed today. Primarily, it is expected to be a report in congress of what has been done in Paris, together with a broad analysis of the world situation following the conclusion of peace. The president probably will explain the guarantee of permanent peace which has been enacted, as well as the manner in which the continued blockade assures Germany's observance of the terms imposed at Versailles. It is also believed the message will outline economic factors necessary for American business men to consider.

John W. Todd, who is in charge of the War Camp Community service, delivered an address this noon before the Salem Ministers' society, telling of the aims of the war camp and what it hoped to do for the returned soldier. The aim of the camp, Mr. Todd said, was to aid in getting the soldier back into the life of the community, assist him in his work and in securing employment to which he is adapted and to help the soldier, sailor and marine in the social life of the city. A practical beginning in this work has been in the giving to every returned man, a membership in the Salem Commercial club. Other organizations are expected to also extend courtesies to soldiers.

New York Ready To Greet Wilson On Arrival Home

New York, July 7.—Final preparations for the reception of President Wilson were complete today. Hoboken school children will greet the nation's chief executive tomorrow afternoon when he steps from the transport George Washington.

The president will be officially welcomed to New York by Governor Smith and Mayor Hylan.

Vice-President Marshall, Secretary Baker and Secretary Daniels, together with other members of the cabinet, will go down the bay on the dreadnaught Pennsylvania to welcome presidential ship.

Following his arrival in New York, the president will deliver a short speech at Carnegie hall. He will then take the 5 o'clock train for Washington. He will reach the capital about 10 o'clock tomorrow night.

4 LOGANBERRY SUITS TO BE HEARD FRIDAY

Phex Company And Salem Fruit Union Principals In Two Suits.

At 10 o'clock next Friday morning the three big loganberry suits will come up, for a hearing before Judge George G. Bingham and Judge Percy Kelly. There is first the official case of the Phex company against the Salem Fruit Union wherein the Phex company in its amended complaint puts forth the plea that any money paid to the Union for berries in excess of the three cent 1917 contract was a bonus and not an advance in price over the original contract. Also to compel the Salem Fruit Union to bring suit against its own members to compel them to deliver their berries to the Union.

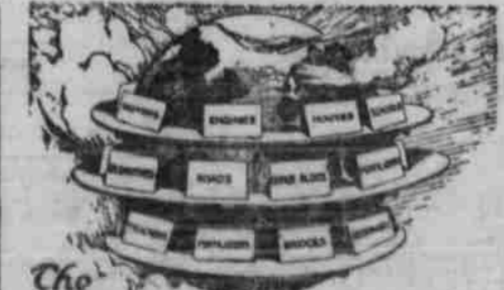
