## GAS COMPANY GIVEN INCREASE IN RATES

### Public Service Commission Grants New Schedule Of Prices Here.

According to figures presented by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company in its application to the public service commission for an increase of gas rates, there is as much chance of a profit in producing gas under present rates as there is in jobbing palm leaf fans in Greenland.

The appeal of the gas company for an increase of rates came before the commission last September, with City Attorney Macey representing the municipality. At this hearing figures were presented by the company showing that the valuation of the plant and equipment was about \$215,575, and that the company was carrying a bonded indebtedness of \$148,350, or 69 per cent of the value of the plant as determined by the commission.

The company went on to show that since the year 1913 the rates to consumers were as follows: \$1.60 per 1000 feet for first 30,000 feet of monthly consumption. All monthly consumption in excess of 40,000 feet, \$1.50 per 1000 feet. A cash discount of 10 per cent was allowed on each 1000 for prompt payment.

With these rates in effect it was shown that the company had operated for more than six years at a loss of \$1837.83; and when to this operating loss was added the annual interest payment on bonded indebtedness, it was shown that the aggregate loss for the six years was \$49,531.16. And the statistics further show that the ratio of loss is increasing every year by reason of the increased cost of labor and supplies, the one item of coal showing an increase of more than 50 per cent.

From a full consideration of all the facts the commission finds that the present rates are unjust and inadequate and not on the same basis as rates in other cities; and therefore has issued an order that from and after July 15, 1914, the following schedule of rates shall be issued to consumers in Salem:

First 1000 feet \$2.00; next 10,000 feet \$1.90; all over 20,000 feet \$1.80. The minimum monthly charge is 75 cents, and a discount of 10 per cent is allowed for prompt payment.

Along with this order the company is authorized to purchase and install within six months an additional gas generating unit as shown to be necessary in the investigation.
