LANDERS BOYS LOSE WILL CONTEST CASE

Judge Bingham Sustains Disposition Of Farm Made By Father.

A case of rather more than usual interest was decided today by Judge George G. Bingham. It was entitled Ralph Landers and Arthur Landers against Bertha Landers as executrix of the estate of W. W. Landers and against Bertha Landers individually.

In the fall of 1900, W. W. Landers, father of the plaintiffs, bought a 20-acre tract of land from the Salem Fuel company for \$300 which was to be paid for in cutting and hauling wood. The tract is part of the east half of the southwest quarter of section 22, township 6 south of range 2 west.

The boys with their parents went on the land and helped clear it and helped pay for the farm. At that time Arthur was 16 years old and Ralph 12.

The mother died in 1914 and a year or so afterwards, the father married again. Thus the father died December 14, 1915. By a will, he appointed his second wife executrix of his estate which consisted of the 20-acre farm, and also gave the whole tract to his second wife, leaving \$5 each to each of his two sons.

In the suit, the sons contended that at the time the farm was purchased in 1900, that if they would help their father clear and pay for it, they should be given an interest in the farm. When the deed was made out, it was to W. W. Landers and by his will, the tract went to his second wife, the boys receiving no interest.

The decision upholds the will giving the farm to Mr. Landers' second wife and does not sustain the contention of the sons that their father had promised them an interest in the land for helping him.

In the case of F. C. Bromley against L. H. McMahon, the attorney for Mr. McMahon has asked the dismissal of the case for want of prosecution and also for the reason that a reply was not filed within the time required by law.

America To Have World's Two Largest Battleships

Washington, July 11—(United Press)—The United States navy is to have the two biggest battleships in the world. This was revealed when Secretary Daniels awarded a contract to the Newport

News Shipbuilding company, for battleship 53, to displace 43,000 tons and to have 16-inch guns. A contract for another battleship of the same type will be awarded next week, it was stated. Battleship number 53 will cost \$21,000,000.
