## WELCOME COMMISSION TO CONTINUE DUTIES

### Soldiers' And Sailors' Commission Provides \$1,500 For Work.

The soldiers' and sailors' commission has appropriated from its fund provided for by the last legislature \$1500 to assist the Oregon welcome commission in its work, according to word received by Governor Olcott from F. W. Mulkey, chairman of the soldiers' and sailors' commission.  
A few days ago Governor Olcott and Mayor Baker of Portland both received letter from W. L. Whittey, chairman of the Oregon welcome commission, in which he stated that the funds provided for by the last legislature were becoming exhausted but the commission was desirous of continuing its work of welcoming and assisting returning Oregon soldiers in New York City if it were possible to obtain the funds. Immediately upon receipt of this letter Governor Olcott wrote to Chairman Mulkey, of the soldiers' and sailors' commission, stating that if it were within the law he would be highly gratified if that commission could give assistance to the welcome commission in New York. Mayor Baker of Portland had originally sided the New York commission by furnishing \$2500 from the boxing fund of the city of Portland.  
"If it can be done, I am anxious that the Oregon welcome commission continue its excellent work until the last Oregon soldier has passed through New York on his way to his home," stated Governor Olcott today. "The welcome commission has done especially fine work, according to all reports received in this office, and it certainly is the duty of the state of Oregon to give every welcome and every assistance possible to her boys when they first touch foot upon their native land upon their return from overseas."  
The last legislature appropriated \$5000 for the Oregon welcome commission to be paid out of the \$199,000 fund provided for the soldiers' and sailors' commission.

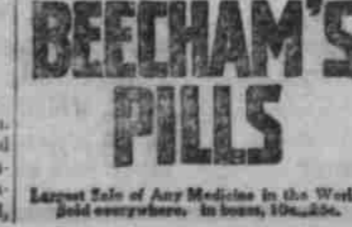

### REPEAL OF

has resulted, as the act of March 19, 1918, has resulted in the United States, in substantial economy. That act was intended to place the chief business activities of the country as nearly as might be within the limits of daylight throughout the year. It resulted in very great economies of fuel and in substantial economies of energy, because of the very different effect of work done in the daylight and work done by artificial light.

### Purpose Is Defeated.

"The work of rehabilitation under this admirable law is not at its height and was to have been given greater speed and certainty by the amendment to section two of the vocational rehabilitation bill, which I have today signed and which places the whole responsibility for vocational training in a single agency, virtually transferring from the war risk insurance bureau to the federal board for vocational education \$6,000,000, with which to support disabled men in training at the generous figure of \$80 a month for a single man and \$100 a month for a man and his wife.

### Says Bill Satisfactory.

"It, moreover, served the daily convenience of the many communities of the country in a way which gave all but universal satisfaction and the overwhelming testimonies of its value which has come to me, convince me that I should not be justified in acquiescing in its repeal."

### Appropriation Inadequate.

"Furthermore," the president continues, "the same section of the Sunday civil bill places such limitations upon the salaries which the federal board for vocational education is permitted to pay that it will inevitably result in the loss by the vocational board of a very large number of men who have made
