Most of this could have been declared surplus and released to the public last February, Chief of Staff March said today before the house subcommittee investigating war department expenditures.

He also admitted that the subsistence division of the quartermaster corps is open to criticism for allowing millions of pounds of ham and bacon to deteriorate in army warehouses.

Latest official figures furnished by General March show the following surplus food stores on July 8: Corn beef \$24,000,000. Bacon \$23,000,000. Corned beef hash \$10,000,000. Roast beef \$20,000,000. Proven meats, including poultry, \$20,000,000. Canned vegetables \$23,000,000.
