DEMPSEY MAY JOIN ZIGFIELD TROUPE

Champion Considers Offer To Star In Athletic Tournament.

Chicago, July 14.—A new theatrical star, in the person of Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, may soon shine in the constellation conducted by Flo Zigfield.

Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, told the United Press here yesterday that he is seriously considering an offer from Zigfield to star the champion in a traveling athletic tournament. Dempsey is to do three rounds at each performance, supported by singing and dancing girls, and athletes of prominence.

The two Jacks left Chicago for Los Angeles in the evening. Both Kearns and Dempsey said that Willard was technically knocked out in the third round and not in the fourth, as many experts claim. Kearns also said that Ollie Peck, referee, and "those society men acting as timers and judges got drunk. They lost their heads. The fight was given to us by Peck in the first round and that's when it was really over.

Kearns said he expected Dempsey to clean up \$250,000 in the next year. Scores of offers are coming in daily for the services of the champion, he said. A circus and several movie offers are under consideration along with lesser offers from Vaudeville, burlesque and park managers. One Chicago promoter offered \$15,000 per week for a few exhibitions.

Dempsey said he would defend his title on this side and would not go to Europe under any consideration. Dempsey will not fight for at least a year, as there is none in sight at the time worthy of a bout with him, Kearns said.

4,000 DOUGHBOSS AND OFFICERS REACH NEW YORK, MANY MORE DUE

New York, July 11.—The transport Saxonia, Valencia and Talos arrived here today with nearly 4000 officers and men of the A. E. F. The cruiser Frederic and the transport W. A. Luckenbach are scheduled to arrive this evening. The Luckenbach and Frederic were off quarantine late this afternoon and probably will dock at 5 o'clock.

On the Frederic are the 824th company, transportation corps, 307th supply company, 824th motor transport company and casuals.

The Saxonia brought in the 350th engineers, headquarters and medical detachments and companies A to D inclusive; 849th and 850th companies, transportation corps and casuals.

On the Valencia were the 87th depot service companies; 114th guard company, army service corps and casuals. The units on the Talos were the 308th repair unit headquarters and medical detachments, groups B, C and D; 541st motor truck company and 829th motor transport company; 225th and 273rd military police companies; 414th service park unit; 503rd meat handling unit and casuals.

New York, July 14.—The White Sox are taking full advantage of whatever it is that has happened to the Yanks but they also are showing signs of a yawning crack in their own power that may come in handy for the New Yorkers within a few days.

While the Indians and Tigers have been mauling the daylights out of the Huggins pennant chasers, the Sox have been mauling the Athletics and Red Sox in such bruising fashion that Chicagoans have vaulted a full three games in front and are going fast.

In winning the victories that have pushed them to the fore, however, the Sox have been forced to pile up anywhere from five to ten runs, for the opposition clubs have found it very easy to land on Kid Gleason's pitchers. Yesterday, for instance, the Red Sox accumulated nine runs off the White Sox slubbers, six of them in a single session with the willow.

The Yankee slump—it can be called nothing else—is in advanced stages. They should have beaten the Indians, judging from what the Browns and Senators have done to the Phil men, and were expected to have a fairly easy time with the Tigers. But both clubs smote the Huggins clans fore and aft. Star pitchers apparently have had nothing to recommend them at the paymaster's office, and Huggins has declined to experiment with anything else.

United States Asked To Attend To Own Affairs

Belfast, Ireland, July 14.—The 12th of July celebrations were carried out Saturday in Ulster on a large scale. Sir Edward Carson, the Irish unionist leader, speaking at the orange demonstration at Holywood, Belfast, said:

"There is a campaign going on in America fostered by the Catholic church which will soon be joined by the Germans and their funds in order to create a great anti-British feeling."

"Heaven knows I want good feeling between America and this country. I believe the whole future of the world probably depends upon the relations between the United States of America and ourselves, but I am not going to submit to this kind of a campaign, whether for friendship or any other purpose."

United States Warned.

"I seriously say to America today: You attend to your own affairs; we will attend to ours. You look after your own questions at home; we will look after ours. We will brook no interference in our own affairs by any country however powerful. It is not for that we waged the great war of independence which has just been concluded. What right had an American mission to come to this country—come here in a breach of hospitality of one nation toward another—to attempt to stir up strife in matters in which they were not connected?"

"The encouragement those men gave the Sinn Fein party has created for the British government far more difficulties than ever before. I believe that the visit of these men and the encouragement they gave to lawlessness, which is being preached throughout the land, has added greatly to the campaign of assassination of innocent policemen who were only doing their duty to their king and country and who were foully murdered on the roadside, with men looking on who had not the courage to arrest the assassins or give such information as would bring them to justice."

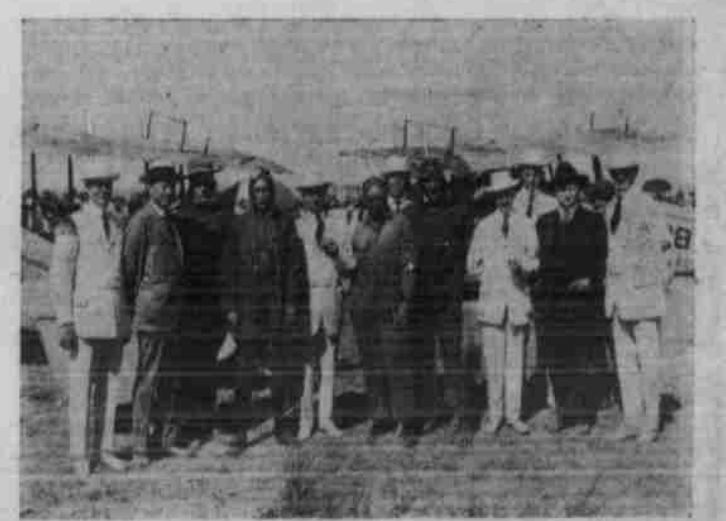
