FOULS AND GAMENESS OF BRITISH OPPONENT BEAT MOORE IN 20-ROUND GO

By Don Chamberlain (United Press Staff Correspondent) London, July 18.—Jimmy Wilde was still the idol of Great Britain today, although only his desperate gameness and Pal Moore's fouling gave him the decision over the Memphis lad at the Olympia stadium last night.

Moore outpointed the British fly-weight champion, but repeatedly struck him with open gloves—Referee Corri cautioned him in the tenth. This cost him the victory. The verdict went to Wilde on points. In the last five rounds Wilde was bleeding at the mouth and nose, but he hung on and forced the fighting, though Moore landed freely.

Moore's best rounds were the sixteenth and seventeenth, when he walloped Wilde all over the ring. Wilde came back in the 20th round, showing a burst of speed and taking the offensive. Wilde missed frequently in the last ten rounds and left the ring nearly exhausted. Moore was fairly fresh.

The America tried desperately toward the end of the bout to knockout his agile opponent, but Wilde evaded him. Seventeen thousand persons saw the fight, which included much brilliant boxing. General Pershing was greeted with loud cheers when he entered the stadium. The Prince of Wales and Prince Albert also were present.

Child Parts Cleverly Enacted More than a score of orphaned children, some of them the most clever child actors who have ever been seen on the screen, aid Miss Pickford in this earlier part of the picture, which shows scenes in the big orphan asylum. Clad in striped chomp cloth, fed upon gruel and thin soup, forced to work at hard tasks, and above all lacking the kindness and love which should be given children, these babies grip the hearts of everyone who sees the picture.

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House Exceeds President's Request For Money Needed In Rehabilitation Service Washington, July 18.—The house more than met President Wilson's veiled objections to the sundry civil appropriation bill. It increased the appropriation for vocational rehabilitation work among soldiers by \$5,000,000, making the total amount available for the work \$14,000,000 and removed the limit on the salaries of members of the board. The president asked only a total of \$5,000,000.

Impossible To Enforce Dry Laws, Samuel Gompers Says London, July 18.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, arriving at Southampton on the Mauretania, declared regarding American prohibition that "it is all rot to think you can compel a country to be dry." It was a physical impossibility, he said.
