Japanese Paper Denounces Attitude Of U.S. In Pacific

San Francisco, July 22.—"America's attitude toward Mexico is to be in every respect denounced and America is instigating anti-Japanese agitators in various places. This attitude of America makes her a second Germany," declares the Yomiuri Choho, an independent Japanese newspaper received today from Tokio.

"This fact, together with the concentration of a large fleet in the Pacific deserves profound consideration by the Japanese," the article continues. "Senator Phelan has made a downright anti-Japanese declaration in congress. He denounced the Japanese as the Germans of the Orient. Declaring that it could not be helped if Japan's feelings should be wounded in order to insure America's interests, he urged absolute prohibition of Japanese immigration."

"This is only Mr. Phelan's opinion but it is difficult to understand why it is intended to injure Japan's feelings by such a statement while Japan is faithfully observing the gentlemen's agreement. The recent attitude of the United States is entirely contrary to the spirit of the league of nations and is causing ill feeling among the various peoples of the world."
