POLK IS CUTTING HAY

Dallas, Or., July 24.—Polk county's big wheat harvest is on in full blast in practically every section this week. As the grain ripened rapidly during the warm weather of the past few weeks the harvest is a few days earlier than had been contemplated by the big wheat growers. The crop this year will be one of the largest ever harvested in Polk county as several hundred more acres were plowed and sown in wheat last fall on account of the high price secured the farmers by the government.

Threshing will begin at an early date. The threshermen are experiencing a little difficulty in obtaining help but expect to have their full crews by the time the season opens. Wages are at a premium this year and a number of boys in the mercantile establishments intend to spend their vacation working in the harvest fields.
