The Valley Packing company in the construction of its plant just north of Salem. It was shipped from Jersey City, N. J., at a cost of \$8800. There has also just been received for the packing house plant, a Kewanee independent water system, which will be most complete and modern independent water system in the valley. It includes a pneumatic pump with a capacity of 100 gallons a minute and a steel tank 28 feet long with a diameter of seven feet. The roof of the plant will be completed by August 10, while the stock yards and viaduct scales, machinery and equipment and refrigerators will be placed Oct. 1. The owners of the Valley Packing company announce that the plant will be ready to begin operation by Nov. 1.

The grades of those who took examinations for school certificates June 25 are being sent out today by County Superintendent W. M. Smith.
