dense, black smoke, and was sailing in an erratic manner, when the steamer Princess Victoria drew near. A boat was launched from the Knight. Passengers on the Victoria were ordered from the upper decks and the vessels drew closer. Then Captain Griffin sent a lifeboat away to take a cinder of men from the forecastle of the burning ship.

The heat in the neighborhood of the burning ship was terrific and all the men in the vicinity were almost baked. When the Victoria pulled away, the Admiral Knight was steaming with ever increasing speed toward Active Pass.

The Admiral Knight is a ship of 650 tons net register. Originally she was the Kusokwin, later changed to the Portland, and as the latter purchased by the Pacific Steamship company and given her present name. She sailed from Seattle at midnight Saturday.

120 Fires Burn In Forests Of Montana And North Idaho

Missoula, Mont., July 28.—The total number of fires burning in the national forests of Montana and northern Idaho today were 120, according to a statement issued by the government forest service here.

A new fire on Marshall creek in the Clearwater forest is burning furiously. The fires in the Lolo and Missoula forests were slackening.

To date 280,000,000 feet of timber have been destroyed. Fires have burned over 126,561 acres, with damage to forest service timber amounting to \$380,000 and to private timber of \$435,000. Three thousand men are engaged in fighting the fires.
