

YAQUINA, NEWPORT & NYE BEACH



Midsummer Crowds at Newport Beaches Embrace Vacationists From All Parts of West Coast

(Capital Journal Special Service.)

Newport, Or., July 28.—During the past week nothing of particular note has transpired to disturb the equanimity of things at this beach, barring a trifling auto accident on the Toledo-Newport road at the Bedford hill, where Saturday afternoon a car ran over the grade without any casualties to the occupants except a shaking up and a good scare. The car was somewhat damaged. It was, however, a narrow escape from very serious results. Considering the reckless driving indulged in by many autoists over the mountain roads it is a great wonder that more accidents do not happen.

A thunder storm, a most unusual thing at this season in this locality is at this moment in progress and is exceedingly distasteful to the campers, fortunately, however, the rain that is accompanying it is very light. The lightning is vivid and the roll of the thunder would do credit to that of a Kansas cyclone. Lightning is just now reported striking somewhere at Nye Creek, the shock throwing the son of Charles Waite to the ground but not injuring him. The youngster was very badly frightened though.

The contract for the first section of the mountain highway from the Benton county line to Newport has been awarded to Newport contractors. It calls for the widening and grading of some three miles of the present traveled road from the depot slough bridge west. The survey on the rest of the road down to Newport is being rush along as far as possible. An effort is being made to change the location of the highway from Toledo to Chitwood, and bring it from Chitwood on down the Yaquina river via Elk City to Toledo. This would make the distance about three miles longer but would eliminate the heavy grades of the present road around the Pioneer mountain. The matter is being submitted to the state engineer for consideration.

The westbound S. P. passenger train limped into Yaquina Sunday evening over an hour and a half behind time with a crippled engine which blow out a cylinder head.

EFFICIENCY WINS OVER FORMALITY; CAPTOR OF THIEF SCORNS CLOTHES

Portland, Or., July 30.—Dragging a frowzy, terrified young man into the police station this morning, E. J. Frazier, well known citizen of Eugene, Or., turned his prisoner over to the officers, asking that he be arrested on a charge of trying to rob him.

Because he was barefooted and shirtless, Frazier created something of a sensation when he hurried into the station with his captive. He explained he was en route to Tacoma in his touring car when the machine broke down near Portland last night. So he decided to camp there for the night.

Frazier said he was awakened about 7 o'clock this morning to find three men examining his trousers, hanging on a nearby bush. When he leaped to his feet the men ran. Frazier succeeded in catching one of them. Holding him with one hand, he donned his trousers, shoved the prisoner into his automobile, repaired the machine and then took the alleged would-be robber to the local police station. He didn't stop to put on his shoes and shirt.

After seeing his prisoner, who gave his name as Ben Medofsky, behind the bar, Frazier started back to the place where he spent the night to complete his toilet.

The Eugene man told the police the two men who ran away escaped with \$300 of his money.
