TWO MORE DEATHS

(Continued from page one)

Garrity declared he will not ask use of the troops placed at his disposal until absolutely necessary.

On downtown streets and throughout the "black belt", there was a calm today. Occasional riot outbreaks still occurred, such as shots from behind corners and from hidden doorways. Most of the negroes kept within their homes, however, and none were seen on the streets in the loop district.

The negro section was patrolled by police who had instituted the zone system. One captain and fifty policemen were stationed in each zone, consisting of about ten blocks.

Snipers at Work. Snipers were at work through the district where most of the rioting occurred. Following shooting of Policeman Ralph Cheney and Jeremiah Murray by snipers' bullets, police raided a house occupied by John Dixon, negro. Dixon was arrested after five rifles and considerable ammunition was found in his rooms.

Governor Lowden remained on the job. During the day he was in have conferences with Adjutant General Dixon, Chief Garrity and Mayor Thompson. He declared that if troops are needed he will put into action every available man.

"The soldiers will be sent into the zone, ready for action," said the governor. "Of course, you can never tell how far it will go and where it will end."

Whites Epitaxial Negroes. Police last night drove a mob of several hundred people from the Sherman hotel in the heart of the loop, where it was believed negroes were camped. The hotel, it was found, was employed white help.

Several lunch rooms and restaurants and dining rooms of several large hotels were forced to close and to hang out signs asking for porters, waiters and kitchen men. Negro help was sent home yesterday by employers through fear of violence or failed to show up for work.

"Dynamite" bullets were found on Thomas Smith and Bob Jones, negro porters, arrested last night according to police. The negroes were former soldiers.

Coolies and collarless, Mahon took up the strike situation. His optimism and the manner in which local union leaders responded to his efforts led city and state officials to predict a speedy return to normal transportation for Chicago.

Today not a wheel was turning on either elevated or surface lines. All Chicago walked or exercised its ingenuity in finding old ways to get to work. Mahon's first effort was to call local union leaders to a conference regarding submission of the proposed strike settlement or a referendum. The proposal was hooted down when presented verbally Monday night. Following the conference Mahon was to meet Barney Cohen, state labor director, delegated as
