HIGH TEMPERATURE IN JULY AVERAGED AT 80

Month Warmer Than During Preceding Year; Rainfall Is Light.

The average maximum temperature for the month of July was 80 and the average minimum 53. The maximum for the month was 95 on the 14th and the minimum 48 on the night of the 1st. One year ago the average maximum for July was 77 with an average minimum of 55. But the past month was not hot as July of 1917 when the average maximum was 84. July of 1916 was a cool month with an average maximum of 74. The monthly temperature does not change to any extent as ten years ago the maximum average for July was 72 with averages from year to year running from 70 to 84.

July is a pretty safe month to travel with, not much to fear from rainfall. During the past ten years the rainfall for the months has been as follows, according to the official record:

frightened during their four days of terror that few of them are seen outside of their homes. In all 19 negroes and 15 whites lost their lives. First action for relief in the negro district and for solving the race problem was taken by the city council when ten resolutions and orders were drafted. Additional protection was offered in a bill calling for 2000 extra police to be added to the department.

Both white and negro civic organizations scheduled meetings for today for discussion of means of solving the race problem. Politics was blamed by sev-

eral, while idleness, high prices and general unrest was usually taken as responsible for the outbreak.

Primrose Leaves \$25,000 To His Wife And Brother

Portland, Or., July 31.—Real estate, bonds and mortgages to the total value of \$25,000 were left in Multnomah county, Oregon, by George Henry Primrose, the noted "soft shoe" dancer who died July 23 of San Diego.

Primrose, in his will, left his entire estate to his wife and brother, Albert Primrose, both of Portland, it being equally divided between them.

Mrs. Primrose, who was formerly his secretary for many years, was the famous minstrel's second wife.
