WAR HEROES, TEETH, FISH AND BIGAMY

Intimate Glimpse of Men and People in France After the Big War.

Paris.—(By Mail.)—Details have just been received from Lille on what is considered without question the greatest contribution made to the war by any one single family.

The head of this family was Monsieur Vanhee, a farmer living at Reminghe, near Ypres. At the outbreak of the war he was the father of 36 living children, fourteen girls and twenty-two boys. Of these twenty thirteen were killed and three were permanently discharged as the result of wounds sustaining them for further service. Still another was wounded four times during the war.

In 1917, the widow of one of the sons, Alfred, was also killed during the bombardment of Dunkerque. She left five orphans. But even before this, Monsieur Vanhee had already given up his life to the Germans. In October of 1914 he had come to Lille with one of his daughters to celebrate the birthday of a relative. On his return home, the two were caught by a German patrol and both shot.

A winner of the Croix de Guerre when only three and a half years old is the unapproachable record of little Roger, Roux of Saint Die, France. Roger is now eight years old and has only just received the war decoration, but his citation mentions a service that he performed nearly five years ago, when the Germans rushed into his little home town on the French Alsatian border.

Little Roger flatly refused to have any dealings with the enemy. Though just a tiny tot he resisted the presumption of the Prussians who tried to make friends with him. But Roger wouldn't be won over. He refused even to say "bon jour" to the enemy and now wears the Croix de Guerre for his sternness in the face of the enemy "advances."

Travel by air routes and avoid the congesting of the already overworked railroads. That in substance is the plea now being made by aviation promoters in Germany. Time schedules of German passenger-carrying air services have been received in Paris. Extensive advertising of the air routes is being carried on, the backers of the project pointing out the advantages of aeroplane travel over that of trains, and practically begging the public to give the railroads a chance to rebuild and to repair the wear and tear of the past four years.

According to the time schedule received here, regular civilian air service has been established between the Berlin and the cities of Hamburg, Hanover, Leipzig, Weimar and several other of the larger cities.

Large shipments of salmon, better known to the American doughboys as "goldfish," which were destined to be consumed by the A. E. F. are now being shipped to the Italian army of occupation in the Tyrol. Great quantities of the sustaining but unappetizing food were on hand at the American warehouses in Marselles when the war ended. With the rapidly diminishing demand of the A. E. F., much of the canned salmon has been reshipped to Genoa and thence overland to the Italian front. The Italian like the worsted American "goldfish," a food which long since lost its attrac-

tiveness where doughboys are concerned.

France has found still another means of living up to the national motto, "Liberty, Equality, Fraternity." A simple "pulla," a private soldier of the second grade with nothing to his particular credit other than that he represents the great mass of the "pollux" of France has been named a candidate for the French academy. The "Forty Immortals" have added two great soldiers—Joffre and Foch—to their numbers but it remained for the League of Nations organization of French veterans, to really undertake the democratizing of the military branch of the most famous of France's intellectual organizations. The league has nominated Louis Armand Gromilly, one of its members, as candidate for the seat now vacant in the academy.

Approximately four thousand army dentists in a combined attack on the jaws of nearly two million doughboys succeeded in capturing 67,133 teeth during one month alone. All records for tooth extractions in the A. E. F. were broken in that month when this enormous number of teeth was removed from the aching jaws of America's "over here" heroes.

Pulling teeth was not the only occupation of the fearless army dentists, for during the same month 376,655 fillings were put in.

The chief dental surgeon of the A. E. F. reports that during the course of hostilities seven army dentists were killed by shell fire and that over forty were injured.

Advice to prospective bigamists. Before becoming a bigamist, it will be advisable to win honors on the field of battle if you would escape the penalties of the law.

The French military court has just pardoned a soldier-bigamist. Jean Abele's home is in Commines. In 1910 he married Mile. Meuschiet and lived happily with her until August, 1914, when he was called to the colors. He was wounded three times and was twice cited for the Croix de Guerre. In 1915, while on convalescence leave he met Mile. Detroit, and soon afterwards, married her. He had passed himself off as unmarried, and until the end of the war all went well. Then came the armistice, and soon thereafter Mile. Abele seeking her long lost soldier-husband, she found him. She also found wife number two. Wife number two agreed that her claims on Abele were indeed rather questionable. Wife number one was only too happy to reestablish her home. The court martial officers couldn't bring themselves to the conviction of the brave soldier.

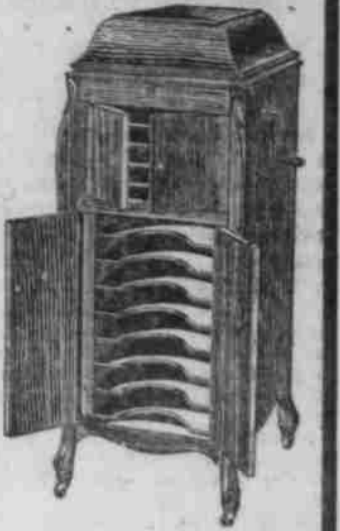
Famed Frisco Tea House Loaned By Its Owner For Hayakawa's New Release
