(Continued from page one) May to take command, these defects would be overcome by the assignment of officers who would be recognized by the federal government. The election of Colonel May was due to the fact that he filled the requirements of the federal government. If federal recognition was to be had, without delay, it is understood it would come quicker through Colonel May than any other officer in the state. Hence it is more than probable that as Adjutant General Staffis has asked him to reconsider any intentions of resigning, that Colonel May was not resigning, at least until the regiment has been recognized by the federal government.

STATE HOUSE NEWS

The weekly report of the industrial accident commission shows that during the past week there were reported throughout the state a total of 522 accidents, of which seven resulted fatally. These were Peter Bording, dairyman, Portland; Fred Finn, electrician, Portland; B. F. Norton, lumberman, Sumner; Henry Garner, logger, Rainier; Abe Chalmers, repair man, Portland; E. W. Moore, lumberman, Lowell; N. B. Lovelace, Rainier, lumberman; Al Seim, Astoria, pedestrian run over by cars. Of the total number 484 were subject to provisions of the compensation act.

In a report to the governor the state board of conciliation, provided for by the last legislature, demonstrates what its opponents have claimed--that it is very limited in its scope of operations in settling controversies between employers and employees, because of lack of authority and power to enforce decrees. It has acted in three different labor difficulties during the past few weeks, with results that were only partially satisfactory. As a medium of negotiation between capital and labor it has served a good purpose, and in at least one case the board induced both sides to agree to a tentative adjustment of the matter of hours-and wages pending further negotiations. Beyond its moral and advisory influence the board can accomplish little as the law now stands.

Superintendent Bennett of the state banking department makes it known that he will continue to act in the authority granted to him by the state law in granting or refusing charters to new banks in Oregon, notwithstanding that the circuit court of Marion county has ruled that the law was unconstitutional. The question has been carried up to the supreme court in the case of the Bank of Commerce of St. Johns, and unless that tribunal upholds the lower court there will be no change in Mr. Bennett's administration of the law.

The office of secretary of state has mailed out to all private educational institutions of the state a blank form to be filled out, demonstrating whether they are or are not equipped with the prescribed courses of study that will bring them within the provisions of the law providing for educational aid of returned soldiers and sailors.

Men who served in the army during the late war and who wish to become citizens, will not be obliged to live in the country five years before filing papers of naturalization.
