He has filed his intention of becoming a citizen and renounces allegiance to the Swiss federation. He came to this country from Switzerland in 1912. He will now wait two years and then appear before the circuit court and the examining commissioner, when he will be given an opportunity to demonstrate whether he understands what American citizenship means and whether he is in all ways worthy and qualified to become a citizen. Although newspaper reports indicate that many who have relatives in Germany are sending food supplies by parcel post, there has been no shipments made from Salem. However, there has been a number of inquiries as to rates and as to what may be shipped by parcel post.

When it comes to incorrect and incomplete addresses, business firms of the city are the worst offenders, according to a showing made at the Salem post office where hundreds of letters are delayed on account of carelessness in writing addresses. It is not sufficient to address a letter just "Salem, Oregon." When the divider or sorter runs through the letters, one thus addressed is laid aside as with no definite address, it is uncertain which carrier will be entitled to handle the letter. Then those letters so addressed must all be assorted over by all the city carriers and the nine rural route carriers, while all this work could be saved if the letter was addressed with the street number or the rural route number. It is the correctly addressed letter that gets out on the next mail. Others are delayed.
