the fleet than the northern harbors.

The older officers, with a keener understanding of rivalry existing between the various coast cities, decline to commit themselves.

San Diego streets were a mass of color today, as the second and last day of the fleet celebration was well under way.

The white caps of thousands of sailors and the gold and blue of hundreds of officers uniforms mingled under the red, white and blue of street decorations. While the entertainment program was under way, with parties for enlisted men, automobile rides for officers and athletic events at the stadium, boats crowded to the gunwales piled out to the huge dreadnaughts, for visiting day was in order.

The climax of the celebration will come tonight at 8 o'clock at the auditorium organ, when Secretary Daniels will make an address. At six tomorrow morning, the great fleet will weigh anchor, and sail to the north arriving off San Pedro at 2 p. m.

There was some speculation today as to how much was just and how much was serious in a remark made by Admiral Rodman last night.

When called upon for a speech he declared that he had a column speech written out and it was in his pocket, but that he was going to keep it there, it having been blue-penciled by Secretary Daniels. Those who saw advance copies of the speech, say that it contained nothing objectionable, and are of the opinion that the admiral was his own censor, knowing that his junior officers preferred dancing to oratory.

The president had full power to act. The appeal of organized labor for government ownership of railroads, backed by veiled threats of serious unrest until the plan is adopted, has so far found no open champion among the house and senate interstate commerce commissioners.

Even Representative Sims, who in-

troduced their plan as a house bill by request, today definitely stated he could not agree to it in many details. He favors government ownership of the fixed equipment of the lines, with leases to private corporations for operation, the owners being allowed to keep the rolling stock. It is generally believed the bill, even in modified form, will not be reported out by either house or senate committees.

Interest now centers in the brotherhood's next move, the threatened exposure of the alleged looting of many railroads by Wall Street interests with a demand for congressional investigation. Nothing definite has been revealed with regard to the conference on railroad control, which Glenn Plumb, attorney for the railroad employees, said had been called to meet in Washington, and to which many prominent persons, including Governor Allen, Kansas, and Frank P. Walsh had been invited. The date remains to be fixed.
